School Facilities

All the classrooms in the school are millennium multi-media classrooms. Apart from the standard classrooms, special rooms and the Assembly Hall, there is a Grace Hall, a Student Activities Centre, a Lecture Theatre, a School History Gallery, a Library, a Multi-media Learning Centre, a LEGO Maker Lab, a Careers Education Resource Centre and Self-regulated Learning Centre, a Multi-purpose Function Room, a Student Conference Room, a Campus Television Studio, a Social Worker Counsel Room, an English Room, a Chinese Heritage and Cultural Centre, a Gymnasium, a Parents Resources Centre, a Conference Room, a Meeting Room, an Interview Room, an Electronic Notice Board, a Rock Climbing Wall and an Eco Fish Pond.

Facing global climate change, starting from 2009, our school was successful in obtaining funding from the Environment and Conservation Fund established by the Environmental Campaign Committee to sponsor “Eco-friendly Energy-saving Classrooms” under the Environmental Education and Community Action Projects Scheme. Besides, being sponsored by the Environment and Conservation Fund, “Green Lunch – School On-site Meal Portioning Project” was launched in September of 2011. A kitchen and meal distribution counter was constructed, and 10 thermo-closets were acquired.

2. Achievements and Reflections on Major Concerns

Major Concern 1: To equip students as proactive, independent and purposeful learners who are visionary, innovative, excel in STEAM, and have broad national and global exposure

Achievements

- **To enhance students’ proactive and self-directed learning culture**
 - Self-management skills and good learning habits are crucial elements for students to become confident and self-directed learners. A series of assembly talks were therefore conducted and self-disciplined learning strategies were promoted to effectively equip students with the above qualities. Secondly, since students were encouraged to develop their lesson preparation habits, self-directed learning resources as well as e-Learning strategies such as “Bring Your Own Device (BYOD)” were introduced in the lessons of all subjects.
 - Students are nurtured as confident learners through constant recognition and affirmation. The application of the teaching strategy “ShareStart” is an excellent platform to showcase the good practices and exemplars from students and this in return enhances mutual learning among the students themselves.
 - Students were trained to develop questioning and problem-solving skills after setting learning goals at the beginning of the academic year. They were guided to conduct self-reflection regularly at different learning stages. In doing so, students can reflect on their learning progress and performance.
 - During the period of school suspension, The Teaching and Learning Committee (TLC) compiled a set of ‘online learning resources’. Students were assisted to spend time learning wisely, enrich learning experience, strive to achieve academic goals and most importantly, develop the habit of independent learning through the above online learning portal.
 - A series of online learning resources such as E-books, vocal books, electronic periodicals, online resources and TV programmes promoting reading from the public libraries were made available in our school library. Students could read anywhere at their own convenience.
 - TLC liaised with various parties including the Education Bureau (EDB), Hong Kong Academy for Gifted Education (HKAGE) and local universities to explore various opportunities for talented students to develop their potentials. This year, 50 S2-S3 elite students were nominated to join HKAGE screen program.

- Streaming strategies were applied in junior forms starting from 2011. Not only could this scheme further motivate high achievers and give additional support to other students, it also enhanced the effectiveness of teaching and learning. All students had significantly benefitted from this arrangement.
- A substantial amount of human and monetary resources were allocated to the English Department to create an English-rich environment. Firstly, two Native-speaking English Teachers (NETs) were employed. Secondly, a spacious and functional English room was designated to facilitate students' English learning. Students from different clubs such as the English Debate Team, Toastmasters Club and English Society can use our English Room to practise for their competitions and rehearse for the whole-school activities.
- To empower student members in the English Society to conduct English activities for the school, three morning assemblies were conducted by three different S5 classes and were well received. This can provide proactive and self-directed students with a better English learning environment. Survey findings showed that our students become more active in speaking English and have a stronger passion in English under the richer English environment. In addition, small class teaching was also arranged from S1 to S6. To showcase students' masterpieces, the English Society issued a publication 'The Embolden' last year.
- English Speaking Days were held on Tuesdays and Fridays while Putonghua Day was held every Thursday. Students were encouraged to communicate in English and Putonghua in different scenarios on different week days. Most of the morning assemblies on Fridays were reserved for the programmes designed by the members of the English Society and the NETs. Various activities such as English Week and English Days were organised by students of the English Society, English Debate Team and Toastmasters Club.
- Student leaders are role models who set good examples for other students. To enhance students' leadership skills, students were given a myriad of chances to organise whole-school activities such as Academic days and English speaking days. Moreover, students are given plenty of opportunities to participate in assemblies and the "One-minute Wisdom" session on Wednesdays and Fridays is an example.
- Reading is one of the basic tenets in education. Activities such as "self-directed reading scheme", "reading channel", and regular 'lunchtime book sharing' with different themes were organised throughout the year. A reading programme of visiting the mini museum of Sun Kei Bookland was held with 428 headcounts of visitors. This activity aimed at promoting a multi-dimensional reading experience.

- To encourage more students to be high achievers, advanced sections were added in all subject assessment papers in junior forms. All students are encouraged to challenge themselves by attempting the questions in the advanced sections.
 - A variety of programmes were conducted to cater for different learning needs of students in junior forms. Programmes like “Sun Kei Science Kids”, “Biology Junior Secondary Pull-out Top Students Programme”, “Mathematics Olympiads School Team”, “Physics Olympiads School Team”, “Chinese Language Writing Class” and “Cultural Learning Course of Chinese Language” were offered to encourage students to be self-directed learners and enhance students’ exposure to the outside world.
 - Students were encouraged to take part in outside school activities to widen their horizons. Two organizations: Master Insight Media Limited and the Standing Committee on Language Education and Research (SCOLAR) co-organised the ‘Chinese Language Promotion Programme – Photography, Writing and Poets’. The first Literary Masters’ Talk – ‘The Significance of the May Fourth New Culture Movement – Lu Xun, Shen Cong-wen, CHANG Ai-ling’ was held on 28th September. A shortlist of 53 students attended the talk and gained profound knowledge from Professor LEE Ou-fan, Leo.
 - The ‘Sharing Conference on Mathematics Education Support Services for School’ organised by the Secondary School-based Development Section was held on 8th July. The panel chair of Mathematics Department Mr. CHU Lap-foo and another Mathematics teacher Mr. CHEE Ka-ho were invited to be the guest speakers and shared their valuable experience on the topic of ‘Bridging between Primary and Junior Secondary: Enhancing Algebraic Thinking Ability’, with teachers attending the conference.
 - A team of English teachers: Ms. MAN Hai-ting, Ms. Tam Ka-yi, Mr. TANG Wan-heng and Mr. YAN Haonam won the ‘Silver Award’ of the International Outstanding e-Learning Awards – English Language Education (2019 / 2020) with the entry of ‘Gamifying Self-Directed Learning with Virtual Detective Game’. This competition was organised by the e-Learning Development Laboratory and the Department of Electrical and Electronic Engineering of the University of Hong Kong.
- **To enhance mechanisms for students’ self-monitoring habit**
- Assessment is a major tool to monitor students’ learning progress. Efforts have been put to set assessment standards with valid and reliable measurement scales. After assessments, reflection sheets would be completed by students and they would in return get comments and feedback from their class teachers.

- The “assessment as learning” strategies were applied. For instance, teachers used pre-test and post-test data to enhance students’ learning and introduced peer-evaluation in lessons. Teachers also engendered and sustained students’ intrinsic motivation with the use of students’ self-reflection sessions in the exam review periods, hence developed students’ self-monitoring and self-regulating skills.
- Data analysis of students’ learning performance was conducted. Students knew their performance in uniform tests and examinations by making reference to the “Cross-Assessment Analysis” and “Percentile Difference Analysis”. Senior form students were also given a projected grade with reference to the standard of the Hong Kong Diploma of Secondary Education Examination (DSE) so that they could better plan for the Joint University Programmes Admissions System (JUPAS) choices and career planning.
- To equip students with self-directed learning techniques and good examination skills for the DSE, both elite and consolidation classes were arranged for different targeted students. Besides, supplementary lessons were also conducted after school to further improve students’ academic performances. Alumni with strong academic backgrounds were recruited to conduct small-group enhancement lessons after school. The feedback from students was positive.
- English learning is not confined only to the classrooms. English proficiency could also be enhanced through joining the English Society. Student members worked with the English Enhancement Team which was comprised of two NETs and two local teachers. These students benefitted from the guidance and coaching of the NETs and local teachers. Students organised various types of activities themselves, including lunchtime programmes on English Speaking Days and English live broadcast morning assemblies throughout the whole year.
- HKDSE Prize Presentation Session was held to inspire elite students through in-depth communication and exchanges of ideas with alumni who had obtained outstanding results in the HKDSE.
- To encourage reading, reading award schemes were designed for students who have fulfilled their goals of reading in a year. In the academic year 2019 to 2020, over 98% students completed four reports on subject-based reading. A total number of 105 students received diamond awards, gold awards, silver awards and bronze awards.

● **To build an efficient and effective eLearning environment and nurture STEAM innovators**

- e-Learning is one of the major educational trends. A series of measures were undertaken to facilitate e-learning. For example, Wi-Fi infrastructure was built in the campus, mobile computing devices and learning tools like VR headsets for e-Learning were purchased. In the academic year 2019 to 2020, 90% of the subjects experienced the use of e-Learning strategies in classroom teaching. New elements were added to different e-Learning strategies, such as Flipped Classroom, Google Classroom and other interactive Learning & Teaching applications. All these measures provided students with more resources and directions to develop their learning habits and promote interactive teaching and learning as well as self-directed learning.
- A number of teacher training workshops about e-Learning such as “BYOD” and “e-Learning” strategies were organised to equip teachers with the necessary skills in using different applications and software. Teachers were invited to have lesson demonstrations showing how the use of different e-learning elements could facilitate students’ learning. Every subject planned and discussed how to apply e-Learning in their teaching strategies. This was followed by in-depth discussion of how these demonstrated teaching strategies could be applied in different subjects and even KLA. In doing so, teachers exchanged their opinions regarding different instructional strategies and practices in catering for learners’ diversity.
- Our school successfully launched the Quality Education Fund (QEF) project “21st century Classroom” with a total grant of \$379,800. Given the success of applying this QEF project, our teachers will actively seek opportunities for expanding different models of e-Learning strategies through various e-platforms. All teachers find the opportunities rendered by this project very helpful for further promoting e-Learning in our school.
- During the school suspension period starting from 3rd of Feb, every subject used different online platforms such as Google Classroom and Schoology to assign self-learning materials, notes, videos, assignments and quizzes. TLC has been in charge of all the coordination work and giving necessary IT and non-IT support to teachers throughout the whole process.
- In order to assist students to learn effectively through a systematic learning schedule, our school implemented the online Zoom lessons at different stages in a progressive way.

Core subjects in junior forms and some elective subjects had a trail on the use of real-time online lessons.

TLC set a Zoom time table for the whole school (online lessons in the morning with learning consolidation time in the afternoon). 2. All the teachers conducted real time Zoom lessons with their classes. 3. Teachers could access the ‘premium account’ which could last more than 40 minutes for one session so as to make teaching more flexible. 4. Members of the IT team gave necessary support to teachers who need assistance for Zoom lessons.
School resumption near the end of May	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. A specially designed time table was made for face-to-face lessons. Every lesson lasted for 30 minutes only. During this period of time, S1 and S2 were still having online lessons until 8th June. 2. Whole school resumption started on 8th June. Junior form students started school 30 minutes later than senior form students. Students from different classes and forms could go to the tuck shop for snacks during recess at different timeslot.

- Our school has a track record in promoting STEAM education in recent years. The KLA departments (Mathematics, Science, Technology, Arts) are devoted to create an atmosphere of innovation from existing resources and opportunities. We have also established a solid academic foundation for our students’ multiple activities.

- The Integrated Science, Information and Communication Technology, and school-based STEAM project curriculum was further enhanced for all junior form students. Students will study knowledge on STEAM elements, coding, robotic in these lessons.
 - The QEF project ‘AI x STEM’ was started in this academic year to cooperate with a university to promote Artificial Intelligence Programme advanced learning, application and practice in School-based Gifted Development. The topics covered in the QEF project include Genetic Engineering and pathology, Analytical Chemistry and the application of Artificial Intelligence Learning.
 - To create a STEAM friendly environment, a STEAM corner was established in the library with 85 copies of e-books related to STEAM education. Besides, the renovation work of the Science and Innovation Centre was completed in Sept, 2020.
 - Students performed well in different STEAM competitions. First and foremost, in the Hong Kong Student Science Project Competition 2020 organised by the Hong Kong Federation of Youth Groups, other competitions held by the Education Bureau and the Hong Kong Science Museum, Sun Kei students won 5 awards including a second runner-up, Social Innovation Award and Energy, Engineering and Environment Award. Secondly, in the ‘Greater Bay Area STEM Excellence Award 2020 (Hong Kong)’ organised by the Hong Kong New Emerging Technology Education Association, two teams of junior form students achieved good results; the first team of junior form students won the Gold Award with another team winning the Silver Award.
- **To promote values education and broaden students’ national and global exposure**
- Maisa Ware from Finland started the exchange programme from 2nd September, 2019. She got involved in most of the major academic and non-academic activities ranging from attending S4 lessons to joining different extra-curricular activities such as Sports Day and Christmas celebrations. She was invited to share some of the culture and traditions of her home country at the morning assemblies. Students did learn a lot from our exchange student.
 - Ho Tsz-yin, Ranee from 5M got a scholarship for an exchange programme to Japan. She attended the Aichi Prefectural Handa Senior High School in Japan from September 2019 to March 2020.
 - WONG Ka-chun got the ‘Yes I can’ award in an American High School Student Exchange Scholarship organised by the ‘YES I CAN’ Education Fund Limited. He would participate in a student exchange programme in Foyil High School in the coming academic year.

- Apart from the subject-based experiential learning activities, extra-curricular and co-curricular activities, a series of study tours were planned at the beginning of the school year to broaden the horizons of students. Nonetheless, students could only take part in one EDB study tour while all others were cancelled because of COVID-19.
- Students are encouraged to participate in academic competitions. Despite of the cancellation of various competitions due to COVID-19, there were nearly half of our students being nominated to participate in local and international academic competitions. For example, in this academic year, our students won the “Gold Award” in the “The Greater Bay Area STEM Excellence Award”, the “Gold Award” in the “China Adolescents Science Video Festival”, and the “First Honour” in the “International Junior Science Olympiad - Hong Kong Screening” and “Hua Xia Cup Mathematical Olympiad (Hong Kong) Preliminary Round”.

Reflections

1. A new subject History has been added to the junior form curriculum so as to strengthen students’ generic skills such as analytical and critical thinking.
2. In view of the situation that students have been making noticeable academic progress in the recent years, the idea of ‘mixed ability classes’ in junior forms is implemented this year. Split classes which group students with similar abilities are also arranged in some of the core subjects in senior forms to cater for learner differences.
3. Regarding the pedagogical aspect, teaching and learning strategies for all subjects will be reviewed for further enhancement. This will be followed by more cross-curriculum cooperation through the coming academic year. A self-appraisal package ‘Key Performance Indicators’ has been compiled for senior form teachers (DSE subjects) to evaluate the effectiveness of one’s teaching strategies in an objective way. Appropriate follow-up plans are expected after the self-appraisal.
4. Teachers are encouraged to incorporate more STEAM elements such as AI and coding in teaching and learning.
5. To further promote e-Learning and implement the ‘BYOD’ policy, more innovative strategies such as interdisciplinary cooperation can be introduced.

Major Concern 2: To enrich students' learning experiences and nurture them with positive values and life competencies

Achievements

- **To educate students with the idea of cross-border thinking in order to explore different ways to establish themselves and others**
 - ‘Moral Education Day 2019’ was held successfully on 10th September. The theme this year was ‘Showing gratitude, cherishing, being proactive and optimistic’. Rev. LIU Yik-yung, the Pastor of Evangelical Free Church of China Spring Church was invited to be the speaker and officiate the opening ceremony. Rev. LIU also encouraged students to believe in oneself, rely on God to lead a religious life, love oneself and others and most importantly, be thankful and cherish all those who love you. The whole event ended with a ‘singing session’ in which students sang to encourage one another.
 - The theme of the Student Quality Nurturing Committee (SQNC) was ‘Showing gratitude, cherishing, being proactive and optimistic’ this year. The school conducted a series of activities such as inviting Dr. Tang chi-kit, Jacky, the Vice Chairperson of the Executive Committee of the Evangelical Lutheran Church Social Service and Mr. Yip Wai-cheong, Jason, the Regional Head of Unit of the International Committee of the Red Cross as guest speakers in the assemblies. The objective of these talks was to encourage students to get out of the comfort zone and to look at things from new perspectives so as to benefit oneself and the society as a whole after listening to the stories of how people achieved breakthroughs.
 - Career-related activities such as “job experience programme” were held. For instance, our school cooperated with Evangelical Lutheran Church Social Service Hong Kong (ELCHK) to organise career intervention and activities. Besides, 10 S5 students joined the “Job Coaching Program” in which they learn life skills in workshops, company visits in a 5-day summer programme.
- **To encourage students to formulate their individual plans by implementing the “Student Holistic Development and Life Planning Scheme”**
 - “Career Interest Inventory” for S6 students was arranged with a debriefing. The assessment was finished in early October. Students reflected that the result of the assessment helped them make better JUPAS choices.
 - The Student Support Day was cancelled because of the class suspension due to social issue.
 - S3 students joined two individual student planning activities. In addition, one round of mock streaming was conducted to help students to make their choices. Official streaming was successfully conducted in July.

● **To provide multi-learning experience to broaden students' experience and cultivate students with positive value**

- More than 85% of students participated in at least one extra-curricular activity or joined one interest class. The Student Potentials Development Committee (SPDC) conducted assessments for all S1 freshmen and collected their achievement records from their primary schools to identify the elite students. In addition, an “iPortfolio” was created for every S1 to S5 student so that they could have a clearer picture of their participation records and achievements. It served as a good indicator of their Other Learning Experiences (OLE) portfolio.
- During the school suspension period, teachers still kept a close contact with students. Class teachers made telephone calls at least once in every two weeks to show concern about their physical and mental health. Class teacher periods were still conducted in Zoom to let students feel connected with school and check whether students need emotional support. Class teachers also took this opportunity to encourage students to spend time wisely.
- In addition to the school wide “Voluntary Service Ambassador” scheme (which promotes students' participation and care about the community activities), other voluntary services were also arranged for all the students to sign up throughout the year. This year, only limited number of voluntary programmes can be organised because of COVID-19. But still we had a record of 1850 hours of off campus service from all forms of students.
- AU YEUNG Kit-yi, Kaye from 5I won the Hong Kong Student Sports Award with her outstanding tennis performance in the ‘A.S. Watson Group HK Student Sports Awards’ organised by the A.S. Watson Group.
- The Gospel week was held from 6th to 9th January. The theme this year was ‘Walk with God’. A range of activities such as evangelical service, teachers’ spiritual sharing, S1 gospel lunch gathering, gospel bazaar and student revival meeting (held by Little Fire Limited) were held at school. Teachers and students participated enthusiastically in the events. Students were encouraged to live with God through all these activities. More than 30 students determined to become Christians and follow God forever. Both students and teachers indicated in an informal survey that they could benefit a lot from the Gospel Week.
- 65 students were recruited to join the “Spiritual Team”. Members of the team participated actively in the school and church activities such as bible study, workshops of worship skills and evangelical events to serve the community. Through all these trainings and activities, they were nurtured to become more devoted Christians and Christian leaders.

● **To nurture a sense of responsibility towards society, fulfilling citizens' responsibility through routine and special civic activities**

- Flag raising ceremony was held in the morning assembly on the first day of each school term and before National Day.
- A Basic Law Ambassador scheme was conducted and both senior and junior form students joined different activities under this scheme. Our junior form students joined "the 6th Basic Law Territory-wide Inter-school Competition". Students who had joined this programme could gain some fundamental knowledge about the development of our country.
- Sun Kei Forums were arranged by the Moral and Civic Education Team. Forum topics were related to the current issues in Hong Kong, China and the Globe. Over 80% of S1 and S2 students participated in the Sun Kei Forum.

● **To organise leadership training programmes, broadening leaders' horizon and exposure**

- Our school entered the final round of the 19th Sai Kung District Outstanding Students Election. We were awarded with this honour for 13 years starting from 2006 to 2009 and from 2011 to 2019, and this achievement boosts our students' confidence and encourages our students to dedicate themselves to lifelong learning and active participation in social services in the future.
- The All-round Leaders organised and promoted intramural events including Academic and Life Planning, Student Quality Management, Moral and Civic Education, Coordination of Form Councils, Student Support and Administration of Extra-curricular Activities and Other Learning Experiences. They guided our students towards self-improvement and lifelong learning.
- The mandatory Leadership Training Camp for All-round Leaders held at the beginning of the school term was a success. It was obvious that students became more well-behaved and showed eagerness in adopting a disciplined lifestyle. Coordination and problem-solving techniques were enhanced and put into practice. Through group activities, students learned the importance of sacrificing one's interest for the benefits of the entire group.
- The Student Council continued to serve the purpose of developing students' creativity and self-management skills. By hosting important school functions, students were able to grow and learn in an atmosphere of freedom, autonomy and self-governance.

- 40-50 students were recruited and trained to become Sun Kei Ambassadors. The objectives of this programme are manifold ranging from enhancing communication skills, passing on the IE cultural values, cultivating good social manners, developing world perspectives and high self-esteem. Group leaders were assigned to take a leading role in both the training sessions and evaluation programmes inside and outside school such as some visiting delegations and primary school visits.
- To honour students with excellent performance in extra-curricular activities, the SPDC has set up a number of awards, such as the Excellent Performance Award, the Outstanding Leaders Award and the Outstanding Service Award.
- Student leaders are role models who set good examples for other students. To enhance students' leadership skills, students were given chances to organise activities in school. Moreover, students sought opportunities to participate in other activities such as Academic days, English speaking days etc.

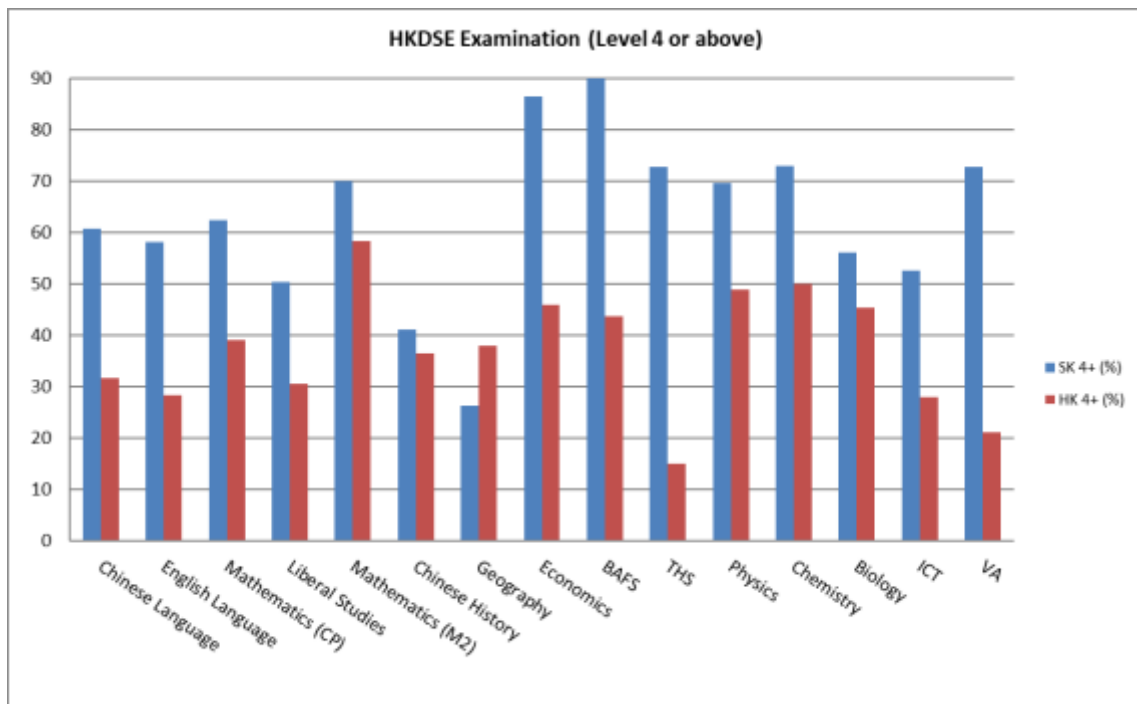
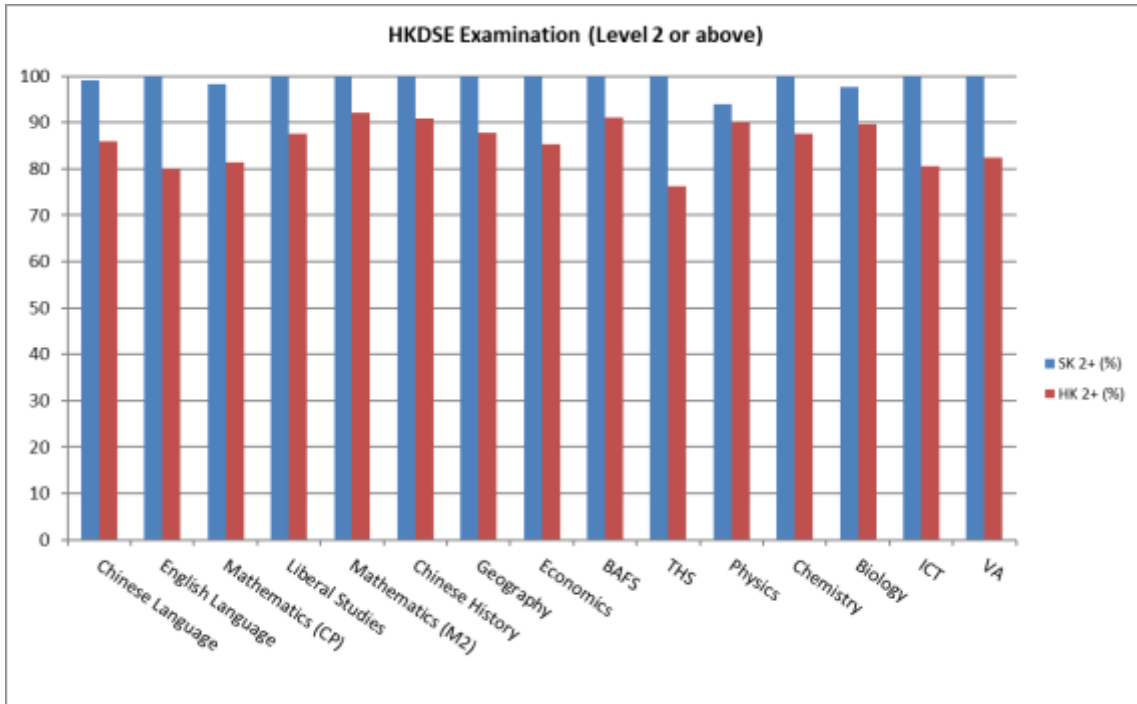
Reflections

1. The cultivation of the qualities appreciation and gratitude among students is of utmost importance. They should also be reminded to think in an optimistic way especially during the time of adversity and challenges.
2. To nurture students with a sense of citizenship and responsibility towards the society, regular and ad hoc moral and civic education activities can be held in due course.
3. Considering the fact that school suspension may sustain and become a 'new normal' in the coming future, extra-curricular activities may be conducted online. In addition to this, online training courses about leadership and other generic skills will also be promoted to student leaders.
4. To provide students with fruitful and diverse campus life, different types of sports classes will be organised during lunch time.

3. Student Performance

HKDSE Examination

Candidates of SKSS meeting the 33222 entrance requirement of universities for degree programmes in 2020 DSE Examination stand at 99, accounting for 83.2% of all Sun Kei’s participants in the examination. Students meeting the 22222 requirement for subsidised sub-degree programmes amount to 117, being 98.3% of the Sun Kei candidates sitting for the examination.



Achievements and Awards

Our school actively encourages students to step outside the campus to participate in all kinds of inter-school competitions. In 2019 – 2020, 49.7% of junior form students and 49.1% of senior form students have respectively participated in inter-school competitions. In the process, students have received various awards and honours making a total of 260 items this year including 24 championships, 16 second places, 17 third places, 15 first honour awards, 28 second honour awards, 21 third honour awards, 3 gold awards, 9 silver awards, 3 bronze awards and 33 merit awards. Details of the awards are shown in appendix IX.

Overseas Study Tours

Over the years, visits have been made to overseas destinations in Britain, Japan, Singapore, India, the Indonesia, and Australia as well as to cities in Mainland such as Beijing, Shanghai, Hangzhou, Shenzhen, Zhongshan and Qingyuan. At the same time, our school is active in developing an education network through pluralistic academic exchanges. In the context of global academic exchange development and related strategic alliance, we have established connections with the following schools.
