School Facilities

All the classrooms in the school are millennium multi-media classrooms. Apart from the standard classrooms, special rooms and the Assembly Hall, there is a Grace Hall, a Student Activity Centre, a Lecture Theatre, a School History Gallery, a Library, a Multi-media Learning Centre, a Science and Innovation Centre, a Coding Room, a LEGO Maker Lab, a Careers Education Resource Centre and Self-regulated Learning Centre, a Multi-purpose Function Room, a Campus Television Studio, a Social Worker Counsel Room, an English Room, a Chinese Heritage and Cultural Centre, a Gymnasium, a Parents Resources Centre, a Conference Room, a Meeting Room, an Interview Room, a Rock Climbing Wall and an Eco Fish Pond.

Facing global climate change, starting from 2009, our school was successful in obtaining funding from the Environment and Conservation Fund established by the Environmental Campaign Committee to sponsor “Eco-friendly Energy-saving Classrooms” under the Environmental Education and Community Action Projects Scheme. Besides, being sponsored by the Environment and Conservation Fund, “Green Lunch – School On-site Meal Portioning Project” was launched in September of 2011. A kitchen and meal distribution counter was constructed, and 10 thermo-closets were acquired. In July of 2021 and June of 2022, our school was subsidised and assisted by the Government under Solar Harvest to promote the development of local renewable energy. A solar energy generation system with 60 solar panels were installed for free under the support by Electrical and Mechanical Services Department.

2. Achievements and Reflections on Major Concerns

Introduction:

Believing all Sunkeians are unique and the gift of God, we hope to provide them with positive and supportive school life and a platform for them to shine for Jesus. The school is going to implement a new three-year work plan (2021-2024) which can be summarised as the two major concerns with themes “deep learning” and “positive and compassionate mindset”.

In order to make our students aware of Major Concern 1 and Major Concern 2, these were printed in their Student Learning Curve Planners and presented to them in early September. The following was a summary of our achievements and reflections.

Major Concern 1: To promote deep learning and to nurture self-motivated learners

Achievements

1.1 To introduce and implement the ideas of deep learning

- Our first objective was to introduce and implement the ideas of deep learning in the 2021-2022. Subject panels conducted panel meetings in July and August to review and revise their Programme Plans, Annual Reports and Schemes of work for more effective dissemination and integration of deep learning. Through regular meetings and sharing sessions, teachers developed greater competence and confidence in designing and implementing activities which cultivate deep learning among students.
- Due to COVID-19 pandemic, a hybrid teaching mode, which consisted of a mixture of online learning and face-to-face lessons, was adopted. Teachers were equipped essential skills in online teaching and video editing. Thanks to new teaching strategies and platforms, students adapted to the online learning mode and maintained fair quality learning. All teachers and students were get used to adopt the Google Classroom or other learning apps to study the learning materials before and after the lessons.
- By the work of the Curriculum and Instructional Leadership Team (CILT), the “Model of Learning” was successfully formulated and introduced to all teachers during the first staff meeting. The resource package for teachers was successfully developed with research-based teaching strategies. The learning package for students would be developed in the coming year. One staff development session was conducted and two deep learning strategies, “Jig-saw” and “Compare and Contrast” strategies were promoted to teachers.
- CILT constantly reviewed the curriculum in junior forms so that students can master the basic learning skills for senior forms. We put emphasis on improving the curriculum to ensure that students have a strong foundation for learning. The lesson notes were revised by referring to the students’ common errors collected from tests and/ or exams, and teachers prepared learning materials related to the curriculum, daily life, current issues and the requirements of the public examination.

1.2 To equip students with deep learning skills and to become a self-motivated learner

- Subject teachers incorporated various means to enhance interactivity within the classroom and equip students with deep learning. For example, learning activities like Think/Pair/Share, Jig-saw Learning, Case Studies to increase students' engagement and participation. With the continual school suspension and the online learning, subject panels and teachers were required to adapt and think creatively to design their lessons. In addition to Zoom, strategies like flipped classrooms for pre-lesson preparation, collecting real-time online responses electronically through platforms like Google Form or Kahoot!, and conducting discussion sessions using Zoom Breakout rooms were employed.
- Moreover, subject panels also designed suitable blended learning modes to allocate morning face-to-face lessons and afternoon zoom lessons that was most suitable for the nature of the subject and the characteristics of our students. For example, face-to-face lessons were allocated for experimental work in science subjects, oral practice in languages and group discussions in humanities subjects, whereas zoom lessons were arranged for knowledge and concept consolidation. These were further supplemented with other online resources such that students could further reinforce their learning in their own time.
- One S1-S2 assembly activity was conducted in early September 2021 to introduce the idea of the "Model of Learning". One goal setting activity was provided to all students by using the materials in the new Student Learning Curve Planner to establish students' goal setting habit. Other goal setting activities were conducted in Class Teacher Periods, Life Education lessons and in subject lessons with students' reflections based on their experience and/or understanding. Reflections were done in Class Teacher Periods, Life Education lessons or when Report Cards were given to students and during Parents' Day. Different issues or events may stimulate reflections. Students showed changes after these issues or events and reflections.
- Student Support Day was successfully organised in November 2021 which helped students to formulate and review their process goal. Self-planning materials and guidance were provided to them.
- The Life Planning Education and Career Guidance Team (LCT) launched multifarious programmes that aligned with students' developmental needs at different stages of growth so as to facilitate their career development. Students were empowered to make informed and responsible choices on their learning, career goals and other aspects of life. The LCT also encouraged every student from S1 to S6 to complete their respective Careers Action Plans including reflections on self-understanding and development, career exploration and careers planning and management. The class teachers discussed with the students on Student Support Day. These records were kept by their class teachers.

- Academic Administration Team (AAT) provided qualitative and quantitative assessment records, cross-assessment analysis and percentile difference analysis for students and class teachers after examinations and uniform test. LCT provided DSE predicted grade to S4 to S6 students. CILT provided statistical reports to subject panels and teachers after examinations and uniform test. All kinds of data analysis did help subject teachers work out suitable strategies to deep learning and help students to plan ahead.
- Our second objective was to nurture self-motivated learners. To promote life-long learning, pre-lesson learning tasks with elements of e-learning and deep learning were integrated into the teaching plan of all subjects. According to the findings collected from subject panels, some subject departments included pre-lesson tasks in the assignment design and the degree of students' participation of pre-lesson tasks was high. Note-taking learning activities were also adopted in some departments. All subject panels reported that the pre-lesson tasks, note-taking and student-centered learning activities effectively enhanced the students' motivation and effectiveness in learning.

1.3 To include deep learning strategies in the curriculum design and the extension of learning

- Subject departments had to prepare teaching activities and materials that involved surface (e.g. notes-taking and checking), deep learning (e.g. group discussion and teacher-questioning in problem-solving tasks), and transfer learning strategies in the first year of work plan. Below were fruitful outcomes from some subject departments in this academic year.
- For Project Research Department, students were given the autonomy to choose a sub-topic for investigation and thus worked on something they were interested in. To promote STEAM literacy, “STEM in Action Ideation Talk”, and the “Hovercraft Challenge” were held for S2 students in February 2022.
- For Geography Department, AR sandbox and VR tour designing tools were used in the lessons. GIS analysis projects were conducted to consolidate knowledge on geography and STEM. 5 students joined the 2022 Open GIS Competition organised by the Development Bureau and Geospatial Lab and were awarded the 1st Runner Up in Category 3: Secondary Category (S4-S6).
- For Economic Department, S5 students took part in the programme ‘Build Your Career’ Entrepreneurial Youth Market” organised by Po Leung Kuk Life Planning & Financial Education Centre, which aimed at developing students’ entrepreneurial spirit and skills. Students were given an opportunity to experience how they should operate a company as they would in the real business world.
- For BAFS Department, S6 students developed a subject-based video archive “Being a KOL” in Google Classroom and facilitated higher order thinking skills and presentation skills. The

experience was authentic, and they had to present their ideas and solve problems independently.

- For ICT Department, different activities joined and held in this year, such as "AI Literacy Programme" organised by the Education University of Hong Kong, AI Generative Adversarial Network (GAN), AI Robotic Arm. Students had a better understanding on the AI technologies behind the face swap video editors and learnt ideas of Smart Retail Kiosks, Intelligent Production Line and Smart Painting.
- Science Key Learning Area (Physics, Biology, Chemistry and ICT Departments), 10 S4 and S5 students joined the "High School Science Camp 2022" organised by the Ministry of Education. Students participated in various online technological activities, such as State Key Laboratories visit, online scientific research practice, and cultural exchange with the students from the university. The camp successfully cultivated the scientific spirit among students, also trained up innovative thinking skills and supported their personal growth.
- To unleash students' potential and to boost their deep learning, we encouraged students to participate in territorial and international award scheme and quizzes in the areas of science, languages, arts and music. For example, in July 2022, 56 S3-5 students took part in the International Chemistry Quiz conducted by the Royal Australian Chemical Institute.
- Internally, student-initiated Academic Club such as Geography Club and Entrepreneurship Club were set up in this academic year. The committee members of both clubs were responsible for organizing PSHE Academic Day in the topic of "ESG-Environment, Social and Governance".
- In order to offer a diversified curriculum to nurture our students' interest in foreign languages and understanding of foreign cultures to become global citizens, our school has offered other language courses for junior-form students and senior form students.
- Gifted Education and Learning Enhancement Team (GLET) coordinated training programmes inside and outside school. About 50 elite students have attended the training offered by the Hong Kong Academy for Gifted Education (HKAGE) and the Hong Kong University of Science and Technology.
- 30 tutorial classes were conducted by alumni in this academic year and over 180 students participated. Over 85% of students agreed that the tutorials were useful for helping them to prepare for examinations and they learnt a lot of exam skills.
- In addition to setting up question bank of multiple choice questions, subject departments encouraged students to fully utilise the HKEdCity Online Question Bank purchased by the school to conduct deep learning.

1.4 To promote deep learning by creating an English-rich environment

- Our School organised a number of extended learning activities for students to build confidence and develop their language skills. By taking part in debate competitions and drama performances, students showed greater confidence in the use of English Languages for verbal and written communication. English Speaking Days on Tuesdays and Fridays also provided students with opportunities to practise their language skills in a relaxed and sociable environment.
- Activities related to deep learning were carried out in English Week such as HKFYG Speaking for All Workshop, Discord Radio Show, Class Slogan competition, etc.

1.5 To promote deep learning through STEAM education and e-Learning

- A Science Innovation Center and a Coding Room were equipped with computer facilities and AI apparatus to support group or individual learning. Interactive whiteboards were installed on certain classrooms. The new facilities did not only enhance teaching effectiveness, also enabled students to be self-motivated learners and encouraged them to take more initiative in their learning.
- To promote problem-based learning, 8 students were nominated to join AI workshop through CLP “Engineer in School” Programme. To organise cross-curricular STEAM activities, QTN project, the “Determination of the concentration of nitrite ion in authentic samples using UV/Vis Spectrophotometer” workshop for students was successfully completed.
- All subject departments endeavored to further promote e-Learning and some departments delivered and collected all assignments through Google Classroom. A variety of e-learning strategies were adopted by various departments. Some departments utilised Kahoot, Quizlet, Peardeck to enhance interactivity and students’ motivation during lessons; while Google Forms were used to gauge and monitor the learning progress of students.
- The use of Google Classroom to provide students with additional resources and the introduction of e-assessment were common strategies adopted by many departments. The feedback was encouraging. Most students agreed that the materials provided were useful to their learning. Teachers agreed that the tasks helped them identify the strengths and weaknesses of the students and adjust their teaching strategies accordingly.

1.6 To provide students with multi-dimensional and diversified reading experience to enhance the deep reading

- The Library continued its mission to cultivate a good reading habit amongst students and encourage extensive reading. Though many events such as Book Talk and Book Fair were

cancelled due to the pandemic, this year library continued to hold many regular activities, for example Reading Ted Talk and Reading KOL so that students could enjoy reading.

- A series of online learning resources such as e-books, vocal books and electronic periodicals promoting reading were made available in our school library. The library collection was further enriched with about 800 copies of e-books, students could read anywhere at their own convenience.
- The Library also collaborated with different departments to foster a more cohesive reading environment on campus. As the pandemic subsides, we hope to engage students in more competitions in the coming year to further engage them in reading.

1.7 To empower teachers with professionalism in implementing teaching ideas regarding deep learning

- To introduce the Professional Learning Community (PLC) Session, every subject department planned and implemented at least one teaching package of deep learning strategy in the year of 2021-2022. Despite the fact that a hybrid teaching mode was carried out throughout the year, a high level of implementation was completed as scheduled.
- Teachers frequently shared their ideas during PLC sessions, especially on how to use new digital tools and integrate new teaching activities into lessons. The majority of teachers appreciated the exercise and they agreed that the sharing inspired them to optimise their teaching methods, tools and techniques.
- To enhance teaching effectiveness and to use data to improve teaching, the school-based Key Performance Indicators (KPI) were given to all teachers. The teachers welcomed this measure and found these useful.
- The Sun Kei Staff Development Day was conducted on 8th December 2021. Principal and teachers participated in the Learning and Teaching Expo 2021 to keep abreast of the latest trends in education. Teachers were equipped with the latest trends and development on deep learning.
- Our teachers, Mr. Chow Wing Hei and Mr. Lei Wing Kuen, demonstrated their teaching achievement with the students in the Learning and Teaching Expo InnoSTEMer 2021 under the scheme of “Jockey Club Community Care and STEM in Action Project”.
- Through lesson observation, the School would see how deep learning skills were put into practice. Effective teaching and learning strategies could be observed in lesson observations. Teacher-student interactions were frequent. Students participated actively in learning.
- Our teachers had always kept up with the latest curriculum development by participating in different professional development programmes. The pedagogical studies also enabled

teachers to explore, design and evaluate their pedagogical approaches, thereby enhancing their professional competence and developing strategies to meet different learners' needs.

- Additionally, our teachers also constantly served as examiners or markers for HKDSE to deepen their understanding of the public examination requirements. Sharing sessions were organised by teachers regularly. These were not only conducive to our teachers' professional development, but most importantly, to better prepare our students to sit for the public examination.

Reflections

1. Since students have already been equipped with the basic ideas of deep learning, higher targets for deep learning should be set while new projects requiring further application of skills of deep learning should be introduced.
2. Subject-based and/or Cross-disciplinary project research work suggested to be carried out by subject panels at different levels to provide opportunities for students to develop deep learning, promote to be a self-motivated learner and to encourage students to think out of the box.
3. To supplement other school-based programmes, the school may continue to tap external resources, to conduct suitable workshops or activities to further develop our students through both STEAM and Entrepreneurial Education.
4. The School will incorporate the good practices into routines and explore the feasibility of expanding deep learning to further cater to the needs of different students and empower teachers with professionalism next year.

Major Concern 2: To empower our students with a positive and compassionate mindset; to inspire students with a sense of respect and responsibility towards society, our nation and the world

Achievements

2.1 To develop students with a positive and compassionate mindset, to inspire students with a sense of respect

- Student Quality Nurturing Committee aimed to build students' character, help them develop positive attitude towards life and become committed social, national and global citizens through Moral Education Day and related activities.
- 'Moral Education Day 2021' was held successfully on 20th September. The theme this year was 'Being positive, to be compassionate and respectful'. Mr. YEUNG Tak-keung, JP, the Commissioner for Sports, Home Affairs Bureau, officiated the opening ceremony. Mr. Yeung used examples of athletes from the Tokyo Olympic Games and Paralympic Games to encourage students to strive for their goals, be empathetic and treat each other with mutual respect. Student representatives from S1 to S6 also responded to the theme and promised to motivate each other.
- Three assemblies with the theme of positive and compassionate mindset were conducted. Four class teacher period activities and a whole school activity were organised to promote the concept of "Compassion". Based on the students' feedback, they have learnt and applied the concept of compassion.
- Movie appreciation activities were organised for whole school students. Based on the survey's feedback, students appreciated the positivity message in the movie and promised to live a positive lifestyle.
- "Eldpathy" is an organization which was invited for school talk during post-exam period. Students were encouraged to think and act with compassionate mindset. Based on observation and feedback from class teachers, students were actively engaged in those experiential activities.
- 5M TSAI Ching-man, 5M CHIM Ching-hei, 5M PO Hiu-tung and 5P WONG Tsz-ching won the Canadian Special Award (Toronto Int'l Society of Innovation & Advanced Skills (TSIAS)) and Gold Award for their "Octo-Bus" project - Barrier Free Travelling (BUS) System for visually impaired person based on ibeacon Positioning & Real Time Database. They applied the concept of compassion into this project.
- The Parents' Talk was smoothly conducted on 26th November 2021. The theme of the talk was 'Know your child and yourself, all rise together — Five ways of Effective Parenting'. Guest speaker was Dr. C. Harry HUI, who is a serving industrial-organisational psychologist, Honorary Associate Professor in the HKU Department of Psychology and member of the International Applied Psychology Society. Dr. C. Harry HUI talked about why parents fail to

effectively discipline their children and offered advice on getting along with them in harmony. Strategies included knowing your own strengths and weaknesses, refraining from excessive criticism, avoiding lecturing with anger, being in your children's shoes and praying for them. Nearly 300 attendees joined this event and all greatly benefited from the talk's rich content.

2.2 To improve main experiential activities of each form to foster students' positive values and affections

- Different experiential activities were held to foster students' positive values and affective characteristics in different growth stages. For S1, rock climbing activities could not be conducted due to the epidemic of COVID19. Instead, we had organised an activity which led students to write a letter for themselves for 5 years later. It encouraged students to set targets for themselves with the value of "begin with the end in mind" implied.
- For S2, students attended a sharing session conducted by a NGO to experience and learn more about the challenges of the elderly people in their daily lives. Students performed well in the session.
- "Warzone 90" was organised for S3 students in which more than 90% of students participated in the activity. It was highly appreciated by the participants and teachers. Students have learnt the importance of humanitarianism during war time. Mission of "protect human lives, care for the vulnerable and respect human dignity" was instilled for students.
- S4 day camp was organised to promote the atmosphere of unity and cooperation among S4 students.
- S5 students attended a workshop which was held by social workers to learn how to release stress. It is worth to continue.
- "Career Interest Inventory" for S6 students was arranged following with a debriefing. The assessment was finished in early October. Students reflected that the result of the assessment helped them make better JUPAS choices.
- The Student Support Day was held on 26th November 2021, on which students met individually with class teachers. Through the half-hour conversation, class teachers learnt more about their study lives, interpersonal relationships and career planning, etc. Our students were greatly inspired to develop new goals and aspirations for the future.
- Value and affective education activities were organised in Class Teacher Periods and assemblies. Nearly 80% of students participated in value education assemblies which were conducted and decided according to different forms from S1 to S6.
- Sun Kei's first Sports Challenge Days were smoothly held from 15th to 16th November 2021. Over the course of two days, our students participated in various individual challenge events, such as Standing Long Jump Challenge, Rowing Challenge, Basketball Shooting Challenge.

Inter-class competitions like Dodgebee, Rope Skipping, Table Tennis Challenge and Fitness Challenge were also held. Athletic energy coursed through the campus and passionate cheers rose from teachers and students.

2.3 To nurture positive and proactive leaders with goals and views

- The Sun Kei 23rd Anniversary Celebration was smoothly conducted on 25th February 2022. The celebration activities were organised by All-round Leaders and the Student Council. Teachers and students reviewed the missions and development of the school together, and expressed gratitude and devotion to God, who has always guarded and led us. The activities included sharing of the fruit of STEM, choir performance, quiz games, etc. This brought infinite joy to the audience and left unforgettable memories.
- Our school leaders team won seven awards in the ‘20th Sai Kung District Outstanding Students Election’. With phenomenal performance, SKSS claimed the Best School Team Award for the fifteenth time this year. Students also won the Outstanding Students Awards in the Senior Secondary Section and Junior Secondary Section. The award gave recognition and appreciation to students for their excellent leadership. It also encouraged students to have positive influence on their peers so that they would also dedicate themselves to lifelong learning and participate actively in social services in the future.
- 6R LUI Michelle and 6M YEUNG Ho-yi Chloe were selected the ‘Top 10 Outstanding Students in the New Territories (Senior)’ and 4M SO Wing-kiu was selected the ‘Top 10 Outstanding Students in the New Territories (Junior)’ in the Outstanding Student Election of New Territories 2021 jointly organised by the Federation of New Territories Youth, New Territories Youth Development Foundations and the Hong Kong Outstanding Students’ Association. Over a thousand students from 150 secondary schools in the New Territories participated in this Election. Having gone through a series of tests including written tests, creation of short clips and face-to-face interviews, the Judging Panel selected five students each from junior and senior forms. Our School stood out from the crowd with encouraging results as three of our students were elected as Outstanding Students.
- 5P LIN Ka-yeung received “Student with Distinction” and “Most Popular Campaign Team Award” in the “Mock Chief Executive Election Forum” which organised by The ARETE.

2.4 To build up positive values like self-confidence, caring for others and commitment by promoting “Service Learning”

- Service learning combined volunteer activities with the intent that the activities could change both the recipients and the providers of the service. The best learning experience would not be gained by passive participation in school activities, but was acquired in situations shaped and initiated by the students. Our school provided many opportunities for our students to serve the community in this way, such as Girls Guides, Boys Scouts, Red Cross Youth Unit.

Students organised and took part in various activities such as volunteering at Kelly Animals Shelter, Orbis fundraising campaign to serve the community. Flag selling and charity sales were arranged for and by our students.

- To build up self-confidence, caring for others and commitment, the Student Council (SC) upheld its commitment to the school. Through the school-based and joint-school events held throughout the year, the SC aimed to promote a vibrant and diversified student life, which in turn boosted students' sense of belonging to the Sun Kei family and the society.
- Our students participated in both on and off campus volunteer services, the total hours of participation in service was 3,436 hours in this school year. For instance, S3-5 students actively participated in the 4C Youth Volunteer Leadership Programme and organised the volunteer service by themselves and learnt a lot very much from it.
- S4 All-round Leaders participated in voluntary service at the Ginkgo House's Viet Street (Yau Ma Tei branch) on 3rd January 2022. The leaders helped to prepare, package and distribute lunch boxes. They enjoyed the experience and expressed that they had benefited a lot. The Ginkgo House established in 2003 and was the Hong Kong's first social enterprise with the goal of promoting employment for senior citizens as well as supporting them spiritually and financially.
- In the scheme of "Jockey Club Community Care and STEM in Action Project", our students understood more about the living needs of the disadvantaged groups, applied the latest STEM knowledge and skills, and provided innovative and effective solutions to fulfil the needs of the underprivileged.

2.5 To develop an I.E. (Invitational Education) Environment by the whole school

- I.E. environment was continued to be created. More visual cues with positive pictures and words were placed on school campus. All classes could choose their own life quote and bible words to represent their class and demonstrated it on their board design. Positive messages through written pieces and sharing on board reinforced their positive thinking.
- Welcome Back Video and morning assembly were prepared by All-round Leaders after the class resumption. As observed by class teachers, students showed appreciation towards the contribution by the teachers and non-teaching staff. All activities enhanced the bonds between the school and students.
- The School prepared some gifts for our students in the Mid-Autumn Festival. Principal, Vice Principals, teachers and core All-round Leaders celebrated this wonderful festival together with all students as the joyful festive atmosphere permeated the campus.

2.6 To nurture a sense of responsibility towards society fulfilling a civic citizen's responsibility through routine regular and special civic activities

- Civic education was carried out in the formal and informal curricular. In the formal curriculum, civic values concerning roles and responsibilities of self towards peers and families, serving our school and community and caring about Hong Kong and China were immersed. Besides caring about Hong Kong and China, the focus of the informal curriculum was on promoting national identity.
- Three Sun Kei Forums were arranged by the Moral and Civic Education Team. The Forums' topics were related to the current issues in Hong Kong, China and the Globe. Over 80% of S1 and S2 students participated in the Sun Kei Forums. Besides, two civic activities, "Election on Top Ten News in Hong Kong" and "Principles of Elections" during the class teacher periods, were also conducted.

2.7 To implement the curriculum framework of National Security Education

- Flag raising ceremony was held in the morning assembly once a week and on the special school days and occasions, i.e. first day and last day of each school terms, sports day, National Day, Hong Kong Special Administrative Region Establishment Day, National Constitution Day and National Security Education Day.
- All students participated in the National Constitution Day Quiz Competition and National Security Day Quiz Competition organised by the Education Bureau. Students were developed with a better understanding of our country's development and a stronger sense of our national and cultural identity.
- Class teacher period activities were organised regularly to promote moral, civic and national education.
- The Chinese Culture Week – 'Learning about the Past and Present with Perseverance and Diligence' was smoothly conducted from 1 November to 4 November 2021. Over the course of four days, a variety of activities including cultural immersion programmes, in-depth reading groups and online theme talks were organised. Our students were immersed in the beauty of Chinese culture and knowledge of the past and present. Both teachers and students participated passionately in the event.
- An assembly for senior form students was smoothly conducted on 16th December 2021. In this occasion, Mr. Andrew YAO Cho-fai, BBS, JP from Friends of Hong Kong Association Limited was invited to give a sharing on "Development of the New Era and Future Opportunities for Hong Kong Youth". The program concerned on China's Two Sessions 2021, the National 14th Five-Year Plan, Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area,

youth development opportunities. Our students greatly benefited from the above program and were better equipped to embrace the future.

- Sinology knowledge competition “Chinese Cultural Zhuang Yuan Hong” co-organised by the Chinese Language Department and the Chinese Society was successfully held during the weekly assembly on 19th May 2022. The competition was divided into Junior Division and Senior Division. Being the first real-time weekly assembly after the resumption of face-to-face teaching, the event was made a success with the active engagement of teachers and students, which created an energetic atmosphere and immersed all participants in Chinese culture.



Reflections

1. To carry on the theme of compassionate mindset, the theme will be consolidated in the coming year in order to enhance students’ attitude of respecting for others and self-respect as well as putting into practice in their daily lives.
2. For the purpose of helping our school get back on normal track and students resume to normal campus life, it is necessary to remind students of school regulations and requirements more often.
3. It is advisable to encourage students to participate in more external activities so as to supplement or compensate the insufficiency of experiential learning due to the COVID-19 pandemic in the past few years.
4. In the coming academic year, promotion of daily life applications could further deepen students’ interest in deep learning. Outside the classroom, students would continually be informed of the possibilities of various service learning programmes.

3. Student Performance

HKDSE Examination

Candidates of SKSS meeting the 3322 entrance requirement of universities for degree programmes in 2022 DSE Examination stand at 102, accounting for 87.9% of all Sun Kei’s participants in the examination. Students meeting the 22222 requirement for subsidised sub-degree programmes amount to 112, being 96.6% of the Sun Kei candidates sitting for the examination.



Achievements and Awards

Our school actively encourages students to step outside the campus to participate in all kinds of inter-school competitions. In 2021 – 2022, 68.53% of junior form students and 58.24% of senior form students have respectively participated in inter-school competitions. In the process, students have received various awards and honours making a total of 208 items this year including 22 championships, 16 second places, 9 third places, 3 first honour awards, 4 second honour awards, 13 third honour awards, 6 gold awards, 26 silver awards, 19 bronze awards and 23 merit awards. Details of the awards are shown in Appendix X.

Overseas Study Tours

Over the years, visits have been made to overseas destinations in Britain, Japan, Singapore, India, the Indonesia, and Australia as well as to cities in Mainland such as Beijing, Shanghai, Hangzhou, Shenzhen, Zhongshan and Qingyuan. At the same time, our school is active in developing an education network through pluralistic academic exchanges. In the context of global academic exchange development and related strategic alliance, we have established connections with the following schools.
