### **School Facilities**

All the classrooms in the school are millennium multi-media classrooms. Apart from the standard classrooms, special rooms and the Assembly Hall, there is a Grace Hall, a Student Activity Centre, a Lecture Theatre, a School History Gallery, a Library, a Multi-media Learning Centre, a Science and Innovation Centre, a Coding Room, a LEGO Maker Lab, a Careers Education Resource Centre and Self-regulated Learning Centre, a Multi-purpose Function Room, a Campus Television Studio, a Social Worker Counsel Room, an English Room, a Chinese Heritage and Cultural Centre, a Gymnasium, a Parents Resources Centre, a Conference Room, a Meeting Room, an Interview Room, a Rock Climbing Wall and an Eco Fish Pond.

Facing global climate change, starting from 2009, our school was successful in obtaining funding from the Environment and Conservation Fund established by the Environmental Campaign Committee to sponsor "Eco-friendly Energy-saving Classrooms" under the Environmental Education and Community Action Projects Scheme. Besides, being sponsored by the Environment and Conservation Fund, "Green Lunch – School On-site Meal Portioning Project" was launched in September of 2011. A kitchen and meal distribution counter was constructed, and 10 thermo-closets were acquired. In July of 2021 and June of 2022, our school was subsidised and assisted by the Government under Solar Harvest to promote the development of local renewable energy. A solar energy generation system with 60 solar panels were installed for free under the support by Electrical and Mechanical Services Department.

## 2. Achievements, Reflections and Feedback & Follow up on Major Concerns

### Introduction:

The annual school theme of 2022-2023 was "To promote deep learning and to nurture self-motivated learners" and "To empower our students with a positive and compassionate mindset; to inspire students with a sense of respect and responsibility towards society, our nation and the world". This was the second year of Major Concerns for the three-year School Plan (2021-2024).

The pandemic continued to disrupt our normal school life in the 2022-2023 school year, but we were able to embrace the challenge and launched a hybrid mode of learning in students. The school timetable was restricted to create more space for students of face-to-face lessons in the mornings and zoom lessons in the afternoon. Luckily, the special timetable only lasted for a month.

Despite the pandemic, the school remained dedicated to enhancing the well-being of our students, utilizing whatever platforms were available under the circumstances. The following measures were implemented to promote and enhance the effectiveness of learning and teaching for academic excellence.

### Major Concern 1: To promote deep learning and to nurture self-motivated learners

#### **Achievements**

### 1.1 To implement the ideas of deep learning

- Under the leadership of the Principal, "Model of Deep Learning" and elements of our major concerns was successfully delivered to all teachers during the first staff meeting in August 2023. It is a good culture to re-visit our core values and mission of our school with all teachers and supporting staff before the start of the school year.
- Based on the annual evaluation reports of subject departments, the school has observed that the following strategies of deep learning were adopted in different subject departments: peer learning, self-marking/self-evaluation of students' own work, online self-directed assignments, project work, issue-based learning, lesson preparation, online question banks, flipped classrooms, notes-taking, etc.
- A number of subjects, such as Integrated Science and Home Economics, have added creative assignments that require research and design skills. Students were obligated to effectively use computers or iPads as learning tools. The tasks were carefully designed to incorporate skills acquired from different subjects. These tasks were well-received by the students and motivated them to engage in self-motivated learning.
- Most students take an active role in their learning and are confident learners. According to the APASO and SHS, over 86% of students are confident in their learning both inside and outside of the classroom. These findings are supported by the SHS conducted by teachers, where over 90% of teachers found that students are highly interested in learning and always

take the initiative to learn. Similarly, the majority of teachers observed that their students are confident in learning. Similarly, over 90% of parents found that their children are deeply interested in learning and take their assignments seriously.

- According to the Teacher Stakeholder Survey (SHS), 100% of teachers agreed that the school curriculum aligned with the educational development trends. They also acknowledged that the school's effort on organizing a broad and balanced curriculum to facilitate students' whole-person development. Additionally, 98% of teachers agreed that the school had effectively deployed resources to support curriculum implementation. All teachers affirmed that the performance assessment methods adopted by subject panels and committees effectively assessed student performance. They also agreed that the subject panels and committees used information and data about learning, teaching, and assessment to evaluate the effectiveness of curriculum implementation and inform planning.
- A Teaching and Learning (T&L) Survey was conducted for all forms from May to June 2023. A great majority of students (ranked 3.86 out of 5 in 2023 and 3.82 out of 5 in 2019 before COVID) agreed that they always review their learning by considering assessment results and teacher's feedback, such as comments on assignments and class performance. They also knew how to make use of learning methods such as preparatory exercises in advance, using concept maps, books, tools, and internet resources (ranked 3.71 out of 5 in 2023 and 3.63 in 2019). Additionally, they always read extracurricular reading materials such as books and magazines (ranked 3.36 out of 5 in 2023 and 3.37 in 2019). They also knew how to set learning targets for themselves (ranked 3.65 out of 5 in 2023 and 3.66 in 2019). These encouraging results inspired our teachers to continue with their good practices. However, we also noticed that student proactivity in learning was ranked only 3.59 out of 5 in 2023, which is a little bit slower than before when it was ranked at 3.6 in 2019.

### 1.2 To equip students with deep learning skills and to become a self-motivated learner

- Project-based learning (PBL) is a well-established pedagogical approach in our school that provides our students with opportunities for deep learning. We have observed that students experience unique learning processes, such as teamwork, problem-solving, information gathering, time management, information synthesis, utilization of IT tools, and presentation skills during their involvement in PBL. The following subjects (Biology, Chemistry, Physics, Project Research and Mathematics) have continued to implement featured mini-projects for their students, as they have done in previous years.
- According to the T&L Survey, over 80% of the students claimed that they had acquired the habit of taking notes in various lessons. Other than note-taking techniques, various subject teachers also made use of flow charts, diagrams, and student-centered activities during lessons to teaching study skills. By incorporating various new elements into lessons, students were urged to put extra effort in their studies.

- Through professional sharing of teachers, lesson observations and assignment inspections, it was observed that our teachers have been incorporating and reinforcing different skills in learning and teaching activities actively, e.g. drawing concepts maps, using Google Classrooms and iPads effectively, and promoting deep learning skills.
- Gifted Education and Learning Enhancement Team (GLET) stretched the potential of gifted students while at the same time, offered remedial support to the students in need. In addition to nominating students to join the gifted programmes organized by the Hong Kong Academy of Gifted Education (HKAGE), subject departments offered elite and enhancement classes to senior form students. In addition, to help students strengthen their foundation in learning, English, Chinese and Math remedial classes were organized on Saturday mornings to help S1 and S2 students who were struggling with their academic studies.
- The Life Planning Education and Career Guidance Team (LCT) provided multi-dimensional analysis and hierarchical planning and organized a wide variety of activities for students to deeply explore themselves and build up life-long goal. For junior forms, the emphasis was put on self-exploration and self-understanding. Career exploration and monitoring principles was the foci for senior forms. Students made use of professional assessment tools, for instance, Career Interest Inventory, Basic Interest Marker, MBTI Occupational Personality Survey to explore their specialty objectively and hence build up their development plan.
- The Parent-Teacher Association and LCT co-organized a parent-child visit to The Hong Kong University of Science and Technology (HKUST) in May 2023. Through visiting the university campus, parents and students gained a deeper understanding of university education and curriculum to help them prepare for their career planning and realize their personal goals. It is a kind of way to inspire our students to become self-motivated learners.
- At the school level, the results of internal and external examinations were analyzed and used to identify students with learning difficulties as early as possible. The statistical reports were useful for teachers to evaluate the effectiveness of their teaching. Students could also use the Statement of Predicted Levels and Cross Assessment Analysis to study their strength and weakness. Class teachers would then discuss with students on their learning goals, academic performances and personal growth on Student Support Day.

# 1.3 To include deep learning strategies in the curriculum design and the extension of learning

• Subject departments had to prepare teaching activities and materials that involved surface (e.g. notes-taking and checking), deep learning (e.g. group discussion and teacher-questioning in problem-solving tasks), and transfer learning strategies in the year of the work plan. Below were fruitful outcomes from some subject departments in this academic year.

- For the Mathematics Department, Math Week was successfully held in November 2022. There were 2 morning assembly activities, 2 lunchtime programs and 1 inter class competition in the life education lessons. The theme was Magic of Origami. Some math theory behind the activities were explained and STEM element was also included in the activities. All the activities were well prepared, and most students enjoyed the activities. But more math theory could be explained. S1 and S3 students produced videos as their Christmas holiday assignment. They worked in groups and chose any topic they liked.
- For the BAFS Department, all S4-6 students had their error books to jot down their mistakes on their own note-books. Moreover, the Department joined the 'Seizing Opportunities in the Greater Bay Area with Entrepreneurial Spirit Virtual Learning Platform – Pilot Scheme' organized by HKEdU. Both are the ways of enhancing the seven learning goals of secondary education, breadth of knowledge and national and global identity.
- For the Biology Department, all S3 classes conducted scientific inquiry (SI) project on how a selected environmental factors affecting food degradation rate/ the distribution of the black soldier flies. SI project offered an opportunity to students to practice language proficiency, generic skills and information literacy. Students were required to do some research and preparatory tasks prior the start of the project. 7 workshops have been held by Biology Society (BioSoc). Some workshops worked on creating a suitable environment for growing coral by doing water quality test, monitoring water quality of marine tank, growing corals, etc. Workshops related to biotech and DNA extraction have been held also. All BioSoc meetings were prepared and held by BioSoc committee members. They are responsible for planning suitable workshops for the members.
- For the Chemistry Department, all S4-S5 Chemistry students participated in the program of Chemistry Online Self-study Award Scheme (COSAS) which was a valuable learning resource to enhance the interest of student in Chemistry learning. Senior form students were encouraged to participate Australian National Chemistry Quiz (ANCQ) too.
- For the Economics Department, S4 and S5 students joined "Youth Flea Market" co-organized with Po Leung Kuk Life Planning & Financial Education Centre, they learned the necessary components of a business plan, including market analysis, product development, financial summaries, and company analysis. Students were allowed to experience how they should operate a company as they would in the real business world.
- For the BAFS Department and the Economics Department, all S4 to S6 Economics students and BAFS students subscribed to "Econ School Bi-weekly Magazine" and learned on economic and business grounds by themselves and wrote news commentaries and expressed their ideas on e-platforms such as IG posts.
- For the Geography Department, 100% of S4 geography students joined the GIS competition and all S3 students completed AR sandbox group work in the lessons. They were able to use

spatial analysis in the study. The latest development of geographical skills could be equipped by students. It was useful to have a better understanding of geography study.

- For the Home Economics Department, 23 students participated in the Low Carbon Diet Workshop by the Green Hub Programme in July 2023. They enjoyed the cooking activity sessions of herb harvesting at the Kitchen Garden, prepared low-carbon snacks, and had a heritage tour on how the revitalization project conserved the historic and architectural values of the building in the Old Tai Po Police Station.
- The ICT Department introduced the concept of AI ethics through participation in stage 2 of "CUHK AI for the Future" project. The learning activities of iCar would be rearranged next year and enhance the effectiveness and develop students' generic skills, such as collaborative and communication skills.
- The Physics Department encouraged to have updated development in Physics. A brief presentation on the Nobel Prize in Physics sparkled the interest of students who are enthusiastic about this topic. It is a way of breadth of knowledge extended beyond the school curriculum.
- For the Project Research Department, students were given the autonomy to choose a subtopic for investigation and thus worked on something they were interested in. To apply STEAM skills through community care, in Phase 1, students completed the product design proposals and the 10 best products were selected by the Proposal Selection Panel. In Phase 2, the project team led students to complete their prototypes and introduced them to the relevant parties for trial. Two best products were selected. Other than the presentation in the lesson, S2 students will present their ideas during the STEAM day.

### 1.4 To promote deep learning by creating an English-rich environment

- The English Department strengthened the proactive and self-motivated learning culture among students by implementing the following ways.
  - (i) Each class in S1-S4 had a mini-library with at least twenty books for students to borrow
  - (ii) S1-S5 students subscribed to magazines every two months
  - (iii)Teachers shared strategies for encouraging students to read books, newspapers, and magazines
- The department enriched students' learning experiences and broadened their exposure by offering a great variety of learning opportunities beyond the classroom. English Society (EngSoc) organized at least eight activities, including English Week, Drama Competition. EngSoc published 9 issues of Embolden and SKEC newsletters.

- English Morning Assembly was held every Friday (except for special school occasions), with each S2 and S5 class taking part in one assembly. Due to the pandemic, the Choral Speaking event was canceled but 27 students finished their solo event.
- The English Week this year was held from 3rd to 8th May with the theme "Think Globally, Experience Novelty". A series of activities, including Bullet Chess Tournament, Spring Fete, Typing Tournament, Kahoot! Quiz, Drama Competition, English Community Newsletter, Acrostic Poem Challenge and Hot Topic Discord Discussion, were organized. The activities attracted active participation from teachers and students and aroused student's interests in learning English.
- The English Department held the Inter-class English Drama Competition on 8th May 2023. Students showcased their creativity and performed with great efforts on the stage. The atmosphere was lively. The performances were well-received by the judges, all teachers and students.
- Activities related to deep learning were carried out in English Week such as HKFYG Speaking for All Workshop, Discord Radio Show, Bullet Chess Tournament, Spring Fete, Inter-class Typing Tournament, Inter-class Acrostic Poem Challenge, etc.
- Because of the influence of COVID-19, no study tour (English Language immersion course) was organized in this school year. It is suggested to organize an English Learning Tour to the UK / Australia of 10 days for 20 students in the next academic year around summer vacation in 2024.

### 1.5 To promote deep learning through STEAM education and e-Learning

- In this school year, each classroom installed with an interactive whiteboard. Both teachers and students can make presentations with more effective and gorgeous audio-visual effects. There was training session for teachers and IT ambassadors in November 2022. 6 online e-Learning tools have been subscribed to facilitate a blended mode of learning. iPads installed with commonly used education apps were supplied to each teacher. All computers in classrooms, special rooms, and staff rooms were upgraded regularly.
- The school has approximately 200 iPads in its possession with Apple Pencils. Throughout the year, different classes from various subjects could reserve iPads for students in their classes. The total number of classroom periods for the year was 6,624 and the total number of borrowing iPads for the lessons was 3,674. Some students benefited from the Government's QEF funding which granted them to borrow an iPad from school and use it at home. 400 students applied BYOB scheme successfully. In addition, students may apply for broadband connection assistance through the QEF funding.

- The STEAM Academic Day this year was held on 10th May, with the theme of 'Sustainable Development Goal'. Physics, Chemistry, Biology, and Information and Communication Technology each hosted workshops on renewable-energy models, biodegradable plastics, coin batteries, sustainable experiments with black soldier flies, AI robotic arm waste classification activities, and manual power bank workshops. Through a wide variety of activities, teachers and students gained a deeper understanding of sustainable development goals and promoted environmental protection through a series of creative experiments, contributing their efforts to save the earth.
- Mr. LEI Wing-Kuen led 9 students to join the "FIRST Tech Challenge" Asia Pacific Open Championships 2023 in Sydney, Australia from the 11th to 18th of July 2023. Among the 32 teams entering the Championships, our school was one of the Hong Kong secondary school representative teams. We are immeasurably grateful for this valuable learning opportunity.

# 1.6 To provide students with multi-dimensional and diversified reading experience to enhance the deep reading

- As for reading, our school has been cultivating a strong reading atmosphere. We believed that developing students' reading habit is an indispensable part of the cultivation of self-motivated learners.
- According to the APASO and SHS, about 83% of students often read materials such as leisure reading materials and newspapers outside class. These results are supported by the SHS conducted by teachers, where over 90% of teachers found that students like reading. Similarly, about 82% of parents found that their children like reading.
- The Chinese Language Department has been organized reading activities at all levels in conjunction with Chinese Language Academic Day. A "Reading Club" and "New Poetry Reading Club" was set up. Each lecture has incorporated cultural reflection topics to facilitate in-depth learning.
- The Chinese Language Department, Chinese Language Society, and School Library organized a Book Talk featuring a living library on 25 May 2023 successfully. Four Chinese Language teachers role-played to create a human library. Panel chairperson Mr. SHUM Tungho, teacher Mr. SO Tsz-chung, Ms. NG Wing-yan, and Ms. KWOK Tin-wing acted as Lu Xun, Che Guevara, Xixi, and Eileen Cheng (Zhang Ailing) respectively to tell students about their life stories, creative motivation and the themes of their works. Students and teachers exchanged their ideas and had a lively discussion.
- The book fair was successfully held from 29th March to 31st March at the school hall. The theme this year was "Civility in the Literary World". Aligning with the theme, the workshop, "Appreciating Intricacies of Words, Savoring the Elegance of Language" was specially designated for students to create greeting cards in order to promote Chinese etiquette. Lasting

for 3 days, the book fair was actively participated by teachers and students, filling the campus with a reading atmosphere. Students will flock to the book fairs to buy fiction and non-fiction books of their own choice or the books recommended.

# 1.7 To empower teachers with professionalism in implementing teaching ideas regarding deep learning

- In this year, the school arranged 24 meetings for the core subjects and 6 meetings for the elective subjects in our every Thursday Professional Learning Community (PLC) Session. There were two open classroom activities to teachers. After each lesson observation, a post lesson discussion was arranged. Teachers in different KLAs could share their views together. All the teachers submitted their lesson plans which applied deep learning strategies in their lesson.
- Two sharing sessions about statistical analysis on the DSE Exam and S6 Pre-Mock Examination took place in October 2023. After this professional dialogue, the culture of professional sharing of good teaching practice strengthened.
- Over 90% of teachers were satisfied with the Deep Learning Workshop training led by the Teaching and Learning Committee in May 2023, with a satisfaction rank of 4.68 out of 5. The workshop helped teachers gain a better understanding of deep learning strategies and how to create effective lesson plans. As a result, they felt more confident in implementing deep learning in their teaching practices. The teachers agreed that this professional learning session greatly enhanced their professional development, with a satisfaction rank of 4.71 out of 5.
- To enhance teaching effectiveness and use data to improve teaching, the school has implemented Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) for all teachers since last school year. The teachers welcomed this measure and found it meaningful. Most teachers agreed that their teaching could provoke students to ask questions and stimulate thinking, as well as arouse students' interest and inquiry spirit in subject knowledge. They have adjusted teaching content and strategies to increase students' sense of learning achievement. Their subject expertise has given students confidence in their teaching.

### Reflections

1. In summary, the year-long plan for Major Concern 1 to promote and enhance the effectiveness of learning and teaching for academic excellence was successfully implemented, thanks to our students' intrinsic motivation to learn and the concerted effort of our dedicated staff members.

- 2. Subject teachers continuously assessed student performance through various types of assignments and tests. The school provided different self-directed learning online platforms, such as the Online Question Bank (HKedCity) and English Builder. As a result, students were able to complete learning tasks at their own pace, while teachers could easily understand the learning progress and results of individual students.
- 3. Using assessment as learning is one of the strategies to enhance students' learning. An appropriate strategy allows students to understand their learning targets. Teachers can monitor students' learning progress and reflect on what and how to teach. It is recommended that subject departments incorporate an element of self-reflective learning in assessment tasks. Different modes of assessment will be adopted in the next year to enhance students' interest in learning.
- 4. The school should continue to encourage teachers to employ various assessment strategies to promote learning and teaching. Teachers should also be encouraged to make good use of assessment data to justify their learning and teaching strategies.
- 5. To provide a diverse curriculum that nurtures our students' interest in foreign languages and understanding of foreign cultures to become global citizens, our school should offer additional language courses for students. In the coming year, we will collaborate with the Academy of the Baptist Convention of Hong Kong to prepare suitable language courses for our students.
- 6. The school should continue to encourage our students to participate in external competitions. Winning is not the only thing that matters. We emphasize teamwork and collaboration, which are crucial to students' development. Competitions help bridge the distance among students and promote collaborative work. Joining competitions can train students in different aspects, including the breadth of knowledge, language proficiency, and generic skills required to carry out activities.
- 7. It has been observed that experiential learning has been widely reinforced across various departments. Although the impact of the pandemic and inadequate teaching time has affected our plans, several educational visits have been successfully arranged. For example, the THS department arranged a visit to Disneyland, and the Biology department organized a Cheung Chau field trip.
- 8. For the school, promoting e-learning is not just a tool for classroom learning and teaching, but also a means to foster students as lifelong learners. eLearning offers flexibility, accessibility, and personalized learning, enhancing student engagement with a breadth of knowledge.

- 9. To recognize our students' academic achievements, we held two Prize Giving Ceremonies in January and July of 2023. This year, 520 students received Certificates and book coupons for their academic excellence. This award system minimizes the negative impact of competition and encourages students to work towards their goals.
- 10. Despite many programs being switched to online mode and some being cancelled due to class suspensions during the COVID-19 period, we hope that our Sunkeians, with the support offered by Sun Kei in the past year, will continue to develop a positive self-image, grow in confidence, and become self-motivated learners during these difficult times.

### Feedback & Follow up

- 1. As a self-improving school, our focus in the coming year will be on cultivating 'selfmotivated learners'. We will achieve this through the implementation of the different programs and activities and the upgrading of our IT infrastructure. By fostering collaboration and sharing among teachers, parents, alumni, external parties and students, we anticipate that students will develop into lifelong learners during this exciting year.
- 2. It is valuable to cultivate students' self-evaluation habits as this can improve their generic skills, including self-management skills. In line with implementing generic skills, creativity, communication skills, problem-solving skills, and collaboration skills can be enhanced when students work in groups.
- 3. To celebrate our school's silver jubilee anniversary, it is a golden opportunity for our students to showcase their talents and shine on stage in the name of God. Through various learning activities, whether led by teachers or initiated by students themselves, they will embody the qualities of Sunkeians, such as perseverance and resilience, while also reflecting our anniversary theme of "Innovate in Legacy, Renovate with Grace."
- 4. It is recommended that we organize a systematic and structured induction course for new teachers who have served in Sun Kei for less than two years. During the course, we will share the mission and vision of Sun Kei, as well as familiarize new teachers with the latest developments in both academic and student development aspects. This will help new teachers identify with the school culture and work collaboratively with their colleagues.

# Major Concern 2: To empower our students with a positive and compassionate mindset; to inspire students with a sense of respect and responsibility towards society, our nation and the world

#### **Achievements**

#### 2.1 To develop students with a positive mindset, to inspire students with a sense of respect

- The Launch Ceremony of Moral Education Day 2022 was successfully held on 15th September 2022. The theme this year is 'Positivity, Respect, Etiquette'. Mr. LAM Pui-tak, Executive Director of the Hong Kong Institute for Promotion of Chinese Culture officiated at the Launch Ceremony. Mr. Lam introduced the origin and evolvement of the Chinese character 'Etiquette' (「禮」) from the philological perspective and encouraged students to treat observance of rituals as the fundamental personal quality and the maxim for getting along with others in society, with a Chinese motto, 'if one does not learn manners, one will not know how to behave properly' (「不學禮, 無以立」). In response to the theme, student representatives from S1 to S6 made a pledge to act in order to motivate each other.
- The Prize Presentation Ceremony of the 5th Outstanding Teaching Award for Moral Education, jointly organized by the Education Bureau and Winsor Education Foundation, was successfully conducted on 3rd November. The aim of the Outstanding Teaching Award is to encourage schools to implement and promote moral education within and beyond the classroom through holistic curriculum planning, diversified learning activities and conducive school atmosphere, with a view to effectively nurturing students' positive values and attitudes, and practising appropriate behaviours. Our school participated in the event with the theme 'Empathy' last year. Thanks to our teachers and students for their proactive promotion and practice, our school was awarded the Certificate of Merit. Acting Principal Mr. HO Chunyan, Vice Principal Ms. TSUI Yuk-ching, Mr. PANG Ying-wai and Ms. LUK Kwok-mun attended the prize presentation ceremony. We are honored to have Dr. SO Kwok-sang, Honorary Educational Advisor and the representative of our school's founding organization, attend the ceremony to celebrate and witness the fruitful results.
- Three assemblies with the theme of positive mindset and sense of respect were conducted. Four class teacher period activities and a whole school activities were organized to promote the concept of "Respect". Based on the students' feedback, they learnt and applied the concept of compassion.
- Movie appreciation activities were organized for whole school students. Based on the survey's feedback, students appreciated the positivity message in the movie and promise work out positive life style.

# 2.2 To improve main experiential activities of each form to foster students' positive values and affections

- Different experiential activities were held to foster students' positive value and affective characteristics in different growth stages. For S1, rock climbing activities were conducted. Students wrote a letter for themselves for 5 years later. It encouraged students to set targets for themselves with the value of "begin with the end in mind" is implied.
- For S2, students volunteered at the dog shelter and participated in beach conservation at Lung Kwu Tan. Students performed well in the session.
- S.3 students visited Hakka Village in Sha Tau Kok. Mission of "protect human lives, care for the vulnerable and respect human dignity" is instilled for students.
- S4 day camp organized, and the atmosphere of unity and cooperation were promoted in S4.
- S5 students attended culture study tours to visit To Kwa Wan, Wu Kau Tang and St. Michael's Catholic Cemetery to have a better understanding on early Hong Kong history.
- Value and affective education activities were organized in class teacher periods and assemblies. At least 80% of all students participated in Value education assemblies which were conducted and decided according to different form from S1 to S6.

### 2.3 To nurture positive and proactive leaders with goals and views

- The Sun Kei 24<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebration was smoothly conducted. The celebration activities were organized by All-round Leaders and the Student Council. Teachers and students reviewed the missions and development of the school together, and expressed gratitude and devotion to God, who has always guarded and led us.
- In the annual Student of the Year Awards, organized by South China Morning Post, 5M SO Wing-kiu and 5S LAM Suet-hei were awarded Top 10 outstanding students in the category of best devotion to the school and visual arts.
- In the Outstanding Student Election of New Territories 2022 jointly organized by Federation of New Territories Youth, New Territories Youth Development Foundations and the Hong Kong Outstanding Students' Association, CHEUNG Abigayle (Junior Form) from 4M and CHAN Yik-chung (Senior Form) from 6M, were selected as the 'Top 10 Outstanding Students'. Meanwhile, CHAN Man-ching (Junior Form) was selected as the 'Outstanding Student of the New Territories'.
- In Sai Kung Outstanding Youth Commendation Scheme 2022-2023, jointly organized by Sai Kung District Youth Programme Committee and the Boys' and Girls' Clubs Association of Hong Kong Jockey Club Tseung Kwan O Children and Youth Integrated Service Centre, our

students, CHEUNG Abigayle from 4M and TING Ching-yim from 5S are honorably awarded the Sai Kung District Outstanding Youth.

- The 21st Sai Kung District Outstanding Students Election Final Round was held on 30th July, 2022. Our school's student leaders team earned 10 awards in the event, including the Best School Team Award. It is the 15th time our school has claimed this award. Students also won trophies and certificates in the Senior Secondary Section and Junior Secondary Section. It is expected that Sun Kei students will continue to strive for excellence and proactively serve the community. Jointly organized by the Sai Kung Cultural Centre Community Development Foundations, Sai Kung District School Heads Association and Friendship Cohesion and sponsored by Sai Kung District Office, this event aims to give recognition and appreciation to students for their excellent leadership. It also encourages students to have a positive influence on their peers so as to inspire others to dedicate themselves to lifelong learning and participate actively in social services in the future.
- In the 8th Outstanding Student Leaders Election hosted by the Arete, HO Kai-fung Clarence from 5M and TING Ching-yim from 5S honorably received the Outstanding Student Award. Congratulations to the above student.

# 2.4 To build up positive values like self-confidence, caring for others and commitment by promoting "Service Learning"

- In the 8th Outstanding Student Leaders Election hosted by the Arete, HO Kai-fung Clarence from 5M and TING Ching-yim from 5S honorably received the Outstanding Student Award.
- S1-S5 students participated both on and off campus volunteer service, and a total of 11,030 service hours were recorded.
- S3-S5 students participated the 4C Youth Volunteer Leadership Programme. Students organized 1 volunteer service and joint at least 1 volunteer service.
- In-school social service (牛牛義工) was conducted twice. Students show their passion in services.
- Participated the "Paddy in our school" programme for natural affective nurture and social service. A series of activities were conducted successfully. Students enjoyed the tour to farmland very much. At the end, social services activities were conducted with Sun Oi Church.
- Participated the "Community Tour Guide@TKO" programme. Three tours were organized to serve different target groups. It is worthy to organise since students and participants can know more about TKO, sense of belongings is also enhanced. It is suggested to organize and cooperate with THS.

### 2.5 To develop an I.E. (Invitational Education) Environment by the whole school

- Organized I.E. activity on the first day of school year, Inviting Classroom Design, Wall of Grace, ECA boards, Post Examination Activity (Thanksgiving Activity), teachers' birthday celebration to promote I.E. atmosphere.
- The Teachers Appreciation Programme was held by the Parent-Teacher Association (PTA) in the morning assembly on 26th April. PTA committee members expressed gratitude to Principal Ho and teachers for their dedicated nurturing and cultivation to students with gifts presented to the Sun Kei teaching team, showing their appreciation and blessings. The Assembly was filled with a heart-warming atmosphere and manifested exemplary interaction between parents, teachers and students, as well as their mutual support for one another.

# 2.6 To nurture a sense of responsibility towards society fulfilling a civic citizen's responsibility through routine regular and special civic activities

- Flag raising ceremony was held in the morning assembly once a week and on the special school day, i.e. first day and last day of each school terms, sports day, national days, Hong Kong Special Administrative Region Establishment Day, National Constitution Day and National Security Education Day.
- All students have participated in the National Constitution Day Quiz Competition and National Security Day Quiz Competition organized by the Education Bureau. They have developed with a better understanding of our country's development and a stronger sense of our national and cultural identity.
- Student leaders showed excellence in organization of Sun Kei Forums. Participants actively involved in Sun Kei Forum.
- Class Teacher Lesson Activities were held to educate national security and civic learning. Election education learning, national day learning and national security learning has been held.
- Nation flag hoisting ceremony can enrich to the national identity of students and teachers, especially resumption of morning assembly at basketball court every Wednesday.
- Sinology knowledge competition "Chinese Cultural Zhuang Yuan Hong" organized by the Chinese Language Department and co-organized by the Chinese Society was successfully held during the weekly assembly on 16th May 2023. During the competition, the masters of ceremony asked a series of questions while all teachers and students were fully engaged with ongoing interaction between the stage and the audience. The atmosphere was lively and had all participants immersed in Chinese culture.
- 68 Sun Kei teachers and students went to Nansha, Guangzhou for a Nansha Cultural and Innovative Technology Study Tour cum Sister School Exchange from 3rd to 5th July. On the first day, Principal Mr. HO Chun-yan, Vice Principal Ms. TSUI Yuk-ching and Vice Principal

Mr. LIU Chi-yung led the group to visit the Sister School - Minxin Hong Kong School (Guangzhou Nansha), where they had in-depth learning and cultural exchanges with students of Minxin. Sun Kei teachers and students rejoiced at meeting again with Dr. POON Suk-han, Halina, MH, the founding principal of Sun Kei, and had a pleasant conversation with her. From 4th to 5th July, Sun Kei teachers and students visited the Hong Kong University of Science and Technology (Guangzhou), GAC Technology Museum, Innovation Bay, Nansha Library and Guangzhou China Resource Thermal Power Company Limited, etc. which broadened their horizons and gave them a deeper understanding of the development and opportunities in the innovation and technology industry in Nansha, Guangzhou.

- Participating in the domino competition themed on 2022-2023 topic of "Civic responsibilities we fulfil; A brighter tomorrow we build", organized by Community Youth Club, LIEW Jiaxin, SHAN Siru, YEUNG Sin-tung and TANG Sze-wan from 3R performed excellently and received both the Best Presentation Award and the Overall Championship.
- The Greater Bay Area Youth Humanities and Cultural Exchange Programme 2023, with the theme "Creating the Future of the Greater Bay Area by Me", was successfully held from 31st March to 2nd April, 2023. The event was organized by the Guangdong CPPCC Hong Kong-Macau Youth Humanities and Cultural Exchange Institute and GBAx Greater Bay Area Youth International Cultural Exchange Center. Eleven teachers and students from our school visited a series of places in the Greater Bay Area, including the sister school, Minxin Hong Kong School (Guangzhou Nansha), The Hong Kong University of Science and Technology (Guangzhou), Nansha Zhongke Aerospace Flighting Technology Industrialisation Base, Nansha Industrial Park of Jiantao Group, CSSC Huangpu Wenchong Shipbuilding Co., Ltd., Guangzhou Academy of Fine Arts, Guangdong CPPCC Historical and Cultural Museum, and experienced a night tour at Pearl River. Through these visits, students gained a deeper understanding of China's development and the technological innovation industries in the Greater Bay Area and contribution to its development.
- According to the APASO findings, the Q-scores for National Identity (Responsibility, Obligations) (Proud, Love) (National Flag, Anthem) (Achievements) are both 116, which shows some positive and observable outcomes related to national education.

#### 2.7 To implement the curriculum framework of National Security Education

• The school regularly reviewed the content and quality of classroom teaching and teaching resources to ensure that the design of the school-based curriculum aligns with the "Curriculum Framework of National Security Education in Hong Kong" which served as the guideline for the implementation of national security education at secondary schools by the Education Bureau through lesson observations, book inspections, professional learning community sessions, and internal meetings.

- The school implemented national security education through classroom teaching in subjects such as Chinese History, History, Citizenship and Social Development, as well as through life-wide learning activities. These efforts aim to strengthen students' understanding of the rule of law and the conditions of our country, enabling them to understand the importance of national security and enhance their sense of national identity.
- The Vice Principal reminded the Subject Panels to read "Curriculum Framework of National Security Education in Hong Kong" and related subject curriculum frameworks during the department head meeting on 25th April, 2023. The Vice Principal also handed out the checklist to complete the relevant tasks.
- All learning objectives and elements mentioned in the "Curriculum Framework of National Security Education in Hong Kong" have been included in the teaching schedule. Relevant learning activities have been added to the program plan or teaching schedule, which can refer to the examples of teaching and learning activities in the curriculum framework set by Education Bureau.
- To facilitate school management, or the Education Bureau to access relevant data for the corresponding learning stages when needed, the subject departments are required to keep the records for no less than two academic years.

### **Reflections**

- 1. In the past few years, school life has been greatly affected by the pandemic. Despite this, all members of the school community, including teachers and social workers, have excelled in providing all-round development for students. Our students have performed exceptionally well in all aspects, showing confidence, persistence, and resilience. With the support of various stakeholders, including parents and alumni, the school has provided significant support to Sun Kei students. We will continue to enhance student support and strive to provide a comprehensive education for our students.
- 2. The plan for Major Concern 2, which aimed to empower our students with a positive and compassionate mindset, as well as inspire them with a sense of respect and responsibility towards society, our nation, and the world, was successfully implemented over the past two years. This success can be attributed to the dedication of our staff members, who nurtured students' positive values such as mutual respect, acceptance, and appreciation through structured whole-school programs.
- 3. After years of experiencing an epidemic, online classes have resulted in social and emotional problems for students, necessitating schools to pay more attention to this aspect.

- 4. While teachers generally have an awareness of students' emotional needs, there is still a need for them to further their knowledge through relevant courses.
- 5. Students exhibit a sense of belonging to the school, willingly participate in extracurricular activities, and actively engage in service. Encouraging students to take part in more community activities can enhance their sense of belonging and broaden their vision of the community.
- 6. Following a series of national security education activities, students have developed a deeper understanding of their national identity and responsibility. It is recommended to arrange more visits to Mainland China or domestic study tours to enhance students' understanding and affection for the country.


### Feedback & Follow up


- 1. Strengthen the culture of a whole-school approach to foster students' development and cultivate a caring and supportive learning environment. To encourage a more positive school environment, it is suggested to make good use of information literacy and social media to deliver positive thinking ideas to schoolmates.
- 2. Arrange more activities to allow students to participate actively in a wide range of areas. To promote the development of generic skills, it is recommended to provide more opportunities for student leaders.
- 3. Provide training for teachers or encourage more teachers to take relevant training.
- 4. Encourage students to help organize and lead whole-school activities for their self-growth purposes.
- 5. To enhance students' national and global identity, it is recommended to increase the frequency of national education activities. It is also possible to organize Mainland China visits and outreach programs, such as a visit to the Hong Kong Palace Museum next year.

### 3. Student Performance

### HKDSE Examination

Candidates of SKSS meeting the 3322 entrance requirement of universities for degree programmes in 2023 DSE Examination stand at 92, accounting for 82.9% of all Sun Kei's participants in the examination. Students meeting the 22222 requirement for subsidised sub-degree programmes amount to 107, being 96.4% of the Sun Kei candidates sitting for the examination.





### **Achievements and Awards**

Our school actively encourages students to step outside the campus to participate in all kinds of inter-school competitions. In 2022 - 2023, 77.36% of junior form students and 66.8% of senior form students have respectively participated in inter-school competitions. In the process, students have received various awards and honours making a total of 338 items this year including 39 championships, 36 second places, 26 third places, 2 first honour awards, 6 second honour awards, 12 third honour awards, 12 gold awards, 24 silver awards, 26 bronze awards and 25 merit awards. Details of the awards are shown in appendix X.

### **Overseas Study Tours**

Over the years, visits have been made to overseas destinations in Britain, Japan, Singapore, India, the Indonesia, and Australia as well as to cities in Mainland such as Beijing, Shanghai, Hangzhou, Shenzhen, Zhongshan and Qingyuan. At the same time, our school is active in developing an education network through pluralistic academic exchanges. In the context of global academic exchange development and related strategic alliance, we have established connections with the following schools.
