### **School Facilities**

All the classrooms in the school are millennium multi-media classrooms. Apart from the standard classrooms, special rooms and the Assembly Hall, there is a Grace Hall, a Student Activity Centre, a Lecture Theatre, a School History Gallery, a Library, a Multi-media Learning Centre, a Science and Innovation Centre, a Coding Room, a LEGO Maker Lab, a Careers Education Resource Centre and Self-regulated Learning Centre, a Multi-purpose Function Room, a Campus Television Studio, a Social Worker Counsel Room, an English Room, a Chinese Heritage and Cultural Centre, a Gymnasium, a Parents Resources Centre, a Conference Room, a Meeting Room, an Interview Room, a Rock Climbing Wall and an Eco Fish Pond.

Facing global climate change, starting from 2009, our school was successful in obtaining funding from the Environment and Conservation Fund established by the Environmental Campaign Committee to sponsor "Eco-friendly Energy-saving Classrooms" under the Environmental Education and Community Action Projects Scheme. Besides, being sponsored by the Environment and Conservation Fund, "Green Lunch – School On-site Meal Portioning Project" was launched in September of 2011. A kitchen and meal distribution counter was constructed, and 10 thermo-closets were acquired. In July of 2021, June of 2022 and December of 2023, our school was subsidised and assisted by the Government under Solar Harvest to promote the development of local renewable energy. A solar energy generation system with 84 solar panels were installed for free under the support by Electrical and Mechanical Services Department.

# 2. Achievements, Reflections and Feedback & Follow up on Major Concerns

#### **Introduction:**

The annual school theme of 2023-2024 was "To promote deep learning and to nurture self-motivated learners" and "To empower our students with a positive and compassionate mindset; to inspire students with a sense of respect and responsibility towards society, our nation and the world". This was the final year of Major Concerns for the three-year School Plan (2021-2024).

As a self-improving school, our focus in this year was on cultivating 'self-motivated learners'. We achieved this through the implementation of the different programs and activities and the upgrading of our IT infrastructure. By fostering collaboration and sharing among teachers, parents, alumni, external parties and students, we were glad to prove that our students developed into lifelong learners during this exciting year.

To celebrate our school's silver jubilee anniversary, it was a golden opportunity for our students to showcase their talents and shine on stage in the name of God. Through various learning activities, whether led by teachers or initiated by students themselves, they embodied the qualities of Sunkeians, such as perseverance and resilience, while also reflecting our anniversary theme of "Innovate in Legacy Renovate with Grace."

### Major Concern 1: To promote deep learning and to nurture self-motivated learners

#### **Achievements**

#### 1.1 To equip students with deep learning skills and to become a self-motivated learner

- Most students actively engage in their learning and exhibit confidence in their abilities. According to the Assessment Program for Affective and Social Outcomes (APASO) and Stakeholder Survey (SHS), over 84.6% of students feel confident in their learning both inside and outside the classroom. These findings are corroborated by the SHS conducted by teachers, where over 95.4% reported that students tried their best to overcome learning difficulties. Additionally, the majority of teachers observed that their students are self-assured learners. Similarly, over 92.8% of parents noted that their children are deeply interested in learning and take their assignments seriously.
- According to the Teacher Stakeholder Survey (SHS), 100% of teachers agreed that the school set clear directions for development in accordance with Hong Kong's aims of education and the seven learning goals. They recognised the school's efforts to organise a broad and balanced curriculum that supports students' holistic development. Furthermore, 100% of teachers concurred that the school formulated clear targets and specific implementation strategies in accordance with our development priorities and targets. All teachers affirmed that the performance assessment methods used by subject panels and committees accurately assess student performance. They also agreed that these panels utilise data on learning,

- teaching, and assessment to evaluate the effectiveness of curriculum implementation and inform future planning.
- A Teaching and Learning (T&L) Survey was conducted for all forms from January, May to June 2024. A significant majority of students (scoring 3.80 out of 5 in 2024, compared to 3.86 out of 5 in 2023 and 3.82 out of 5 in 2019 before COVID) agreed that they regularly review their learning by considering assessment results and teacher feedback, including comments on assignments and class performance. They demonstrated knowledge of effective learning methods, such as preparatory exercises, concept maps, books, tools, and internet resources (scoring 3.82 out of 5 in 2024, compared to 3.71 in 2023 and 3.63 in 2019). Additionally, they reported consistently reading extracurricular materials, such as books and magazines (scoring 3.52 out of 5 in 2024, compared to 3.36 in 2023 and 3.37 in 2019). They also indicated that they know how to set personal learning targets (scoring 3.78 out of 5 in 2024, compared to 3.65 in 2023 and 3.66 in 2019). These encouraging results motivate our teachers to continue their effective practices.
- Project-based learning (PBL) is a well-established pedagogical approach at our school, offering students rich opportunities for deep learning. It is observed that students engage in unique learning processes, including teamwork, problem-solving, information gathering, time management, information synthesis, utilization of IT tools, and presentation skills during their PBL experiences. This year, subjects such as Biology, Chemistry, Project Research, Geography and BAFS continue to implement specialised mini-projects for their students, building on the successful practices of previous years.
- According to the T&L Survey, over 85% of students reported that they have developed the
  habit of taking notes in various lessons. In addition to note-taking techniques, subject teachers
  employed flow charts, diagrams, and student-centered activities to teach study skills. By
  incorporating diverse elements into their lessons, students were encouraged to invest extra
  effort in their studies.
- Through professional sharing among teachers, lesson observations, and assignment inspections, it was noted that our teachers actively incorporate and reinforce various skills in their teaching activities. This includes drawing concept maps, effectively using Google Classrooms and iPads, and promoting deep learning skills.
- The Gifted Education and Learning Enhancement Team (GLET) aims to maximise the potential of gifted students while also providing remedial support to those in need. In addition to nominating students for gifted programs organised by the Hong Kong Academy of Gifted Education (HKAGE), subject departments offered elite and enhancement classes for senior form students. To help strengthen foundational skills, remedial classes in English, Chinese, and Mathematics were organised on Saturday mornings for S1 and S2 students who were struggling academically.
- The Life Planning Education and Career Guidance Team (LCT) provided comprehensive analysis and structured planning, organizing a wide variety of activities for students to explore their interests and establish lifelong goals. For junior forms, the focus was on self-exploration

and self-understanding, while senior forms concentrated on career exploration and monitoring principles. Students utilised professional assessment tools, such as the Career Interest Inventory, Basic Interest Marker, and MBTI Occupational Personality Survey, to objectively explore their strengths and develop their personal growth plans.

- The Parent-Teacher Association, in collaboration with the LCT of the T&L Committee, coorganised a parent-child visit to The University of Hong Kong (HKU) on May 11, 2024. This visit allowed parents and students to gain a deeper understanding of university education and curriculum, helping them prepare for career planning and achieve their personal goals. It served as an inspiring opportunity for students to become self-motivated learners.
- The Sun Kei 25th Anniversary Academic Talks were successfully held on February 5, 2024. The school was honored to invite Professor YUEN Kwok-yung and Dr. WONG Chak-lui Carmen as guest speakers. Their respective topics, "From SARS 2003 to COVID-19" and "A Cancer Researcher's Firm Promise Researching Cancer Treatments for a Lifetime," provided students with valuable insights into scientific research. Following the talks, students eagerly asked questions, enhancing their understanding of the subjects discussed.
- The 25th Anniversary Celebration Activity, I-Classroom, took place successfully on April 23. 2024. On this occasion, the school invited four alumni from various professions to share their academic experiences. Additionally, the Robotics Teams from Diocesan Boys' School and Carmel Secondary School participated in a friendly FIRST Tech Challenge with our students. Many of our student representatives also shared their learning outcomes and exchanged knowledge with their peers during this event.
- At the school level, the results of both internal and external examinations were analysed to identify students with learning difficulties as early as possible. The statistical reports provided valuable insights for teachers to evaluate the effectiveness of their instruction. Additionally, students could utilise the Statement of Predicted Levels and Cross Assessment Analysis to assess their strengths and weaknesses. On Student Support Day, class teachers would engage in discussions with students regarding their learning goals, academic performance, and personal growth.

### 1.2 To promote deep learning by creating an English-rich environment

- The English Department enhanced a proactive and self-motivated learning culture among students through several initiatives:
  - (a) Each class from S1 to S4 was equipped with a mini-library containing at least twenty books available for student borrowing.
  - (b) Students from S1 to S5 subscribed to magazines every two months.
  - (c) Teachers shared effective strategies to encourage students to read books, newspapers, and magazines.
- Additionally, the department enriched students' learning experiences and broadened their exposure by providing a diverse range of learning opportunities beyond the classroom. The

English Society (EngSoc) organised at least eight activities, including English Week and a Drama Competition. EngSoc also published nine issues of the Embolden and SKEC newsletters.

- Every Friday (except during special school occasions), an English Morning Assembly was held, with each S2 and S5 class participating in one assembly. During the Choral Speaking event, twenty students completed their solo performances, resulting in one S5 student winning the championship and one S3 student securing the second runner-up position.
- The English Week this year was held from the 7th to 10th of May with "Unleash Your Potential" as the theme. A series of activities, including iPad Challenge, Spring Fete, Typing Tournament, Meteorological Society Game Booths, HKFYG Speaking Workshop and Interclass Drama Competition, were organised. The activities attracted active participation from teachers and students and increased students' interests in learning English.
- The English Department organised the 2024 Inter-class English Drama Competition on the 10th of May. Students showcased their creativity and performed with great efforts on-stage, creating a lively atmosphere with the performances well-received by all judges, teachers and students.
- The Oxford Study Tour provided 20 Sun Kei students with enriching cultural and educational experiences from July 13 to July 26. During this period, they attended English lessons at Ruskin College Oxford alongside other international students and visited Oxford University, gaining valuable insights into this prestigious academic environment. Staying with local host families allowed students to fully immerse themselves in British life and customs. Highlights of the tour included visits to museums and landmarks, as well as the opportunity to try traditional punting. This experience equipped students with essential knowledge, enhanced language skills, and valuable international exposure, contributing significantly to their personal and academic growth.

#### 1.3 To promote deep learning through STEAM education and e-Learning

- Starting last school year, each classroom and several function rooms were equipped with
  interactive whiteboards, allowing both teachers and students to deliver presentations with
  enhanced audio-visual effects. 6 online e-learning tools have been subscribed to facilitate a
  blended mode of learning. Each teacher was provided with an iPad loaded with commonly
  used educational apps, and all computers in classrooms, special rooms, and staff areas were
  regularly upgraded.
- The school currently possesses approximately 217 iPads, complete with Apple Pencils. Throughout the year, various classes across different subjects could reserve iPads for student use. The total number of classroom periods for the year was about 6,600, with iPads borrowed for lessons totaling 3,320. Additionally, some students benefited from the Government's Quality Education Fund (QEF), which allowed them to borrow an iPad from the school for home use. Students may also apply for broadband connection assistance through the QEF funding.

- Around 405 students successfully enrolled in the Bring Your Own Device (BYOD) scheme.
   Approximately 60% of students registered in BYOD scheme. It was observed that more senior form students (62% vs 51%) registered in BYOD scheme. Possible reason might be related to how frequent the device is required during lessons. We can encourage subject panels to incorporate eLearning more regularly through daily teaching routine, such that students would be more willing to register in BYOD scheme.
- A consolidated e-Learning tools list has been provided to teachers, and a review of the current e-Learning tools has been conducted. 2 eLearning tools for Deep Learning, Poe and Google Scholar, were introduced to students. A staff development session on using ChatGPT has also been held. Most subjects used Kahoot! and Google Classroom in classroom teaching.
- The China Manned Space Delegation visited Hong Kong in late November 2023, and our school was honored to be invited to the "Dialogue Session with Secondary and Primary School Students" exchange event on November 29, 2023. This event provided Sun Kei students with a valuable opportunity to engage in face-to-face communication with aviation pioneers, gaining a deeper understanding of our country's latest developments and achievements in aviation technology, as well as insights into the daily lives of astronauts and their most fascinating encounters in space.
- On May 14, 2024, S.4 Information and Communication Technology students visited the CUHK AI Lab, organised by the CUHK Jockey Club AI for the Future Project. During the visit, CUHK professors and project leaders explained concepts related to artificial intelligence and architectural studies, equipping students with insights to aid their career planning.
- This year's STEAM Day took place on May 22, centered around the theme "FameLab Science Communication Competition." Participating classes from S1 and S2 presented and explained a range of scientific topics, including the nervous system, digestive system, water cycle, particle theory, acids and bases, and action-reaction forces. Through these dramatic performances, students effectively communicated scientific concepts in an engaging manner, significantly enhancing their interest in science.
- Mr. YEUNG Ho-lun led 5 students to Sydney, Australia, from July 10 to 16 to participate in the "First Tech Challenge Asia Pacific Open Championship 2024," organised by Summit Inspiration. Among the 25 teams nominated for this invitational tournament, our school was honored to be one of the representative teams from Hong Kong secondary schools. We are immensely grateful for this valuable learning opportunity, and congratulations to our school's representative team for achieving the "Think Award"!

# 1.4 To include deep learning strategies in the curriculum design and the extension of transfer learning

• Subject departments were tasked with preparing teaching activities and materials that incorporated deep learning and transfer learning strategies in alignment with the work plan for the year. Below are some of the fruitful outcomes achieved by various subject departments during this academic year.

- For the Mathematics Department, to celebrate Sun Kei's 25th school anniversary, the Mathematics Department organised a Maths Trail activity for S.1 students, which provided them an opportunity to know more about the school from a mathematical perspective. Students had to explore specific locations on campus, collect data, make observations, and solve Maths problems. Throughout the activity, students flexibly applied their Maths knowledge and skills in real-life scenarios, showing their teamwork and problem-solving abilities.
- The Physics Department has been encouraged to pursue updated developments in the field. A
  brief presentation on the Nobel Prize in Physics by Principal Ho in October 2023 sparked the
  interest of students passionate about this topic. This initiative serves to broaden their
  knowledge beyond the school curriculum.
- For the Chemistry Department, one theme-based project has been conducted for S4 students, along with two workshops on Analytical and Forensic Chemistry organised for members of the Chemistry Society. Following these workshops, students showcased their experiments during the 25th School Anniversary Open Day. Additionally, the Chemistry Online Self-Study Award Scheme (COSAS) serves as a valuable resource to enhance student interest in Chemistry learning.
- For Biology Department, the gifted education program and participation in external competitions have greatly benefited Biology students, highlighted by events such as the International Biology Olympiad and the Hong Kong Biology Literacy Award. Notably, 17 S3-4 students participated in the iGEM Competition. All meetings of the Biology Society are meticulously planned and executed by its committee members, who are responsible for designing appropriate workshops for their peers, resulting in over 90% attendance among members. These initiatives have enhanced students' interest and knowledge in biology, while also fostering leadership and organizational skills among student leaders, creating a vibrant and enriching educational environment.
- For the Economics Department, 18 students participated in the "MEET 2gether 2023-2024" youth bazaar experience, held from April 6 to 7, 2024. Organised by the Po Leung Kuk Life Planning and Financial Education Centre, this event allowed students to simulate real-life company operations, where they applied entrepreneurship skills in teams. This experience not only enhanced their diverse thinking and application skills but also unleashed their pioneering and innovative spirits akin to those of entrepreneurs.
- For the BAFS Department, 28 S4-5 students and 22 S3 students were awarded in the Online Quiz Competition on Lifetime Risks and Protection 2024, as well as the Finance Online Quiz Competition organised by the Hong Kong Family Welfare Society Financial Education Centre and the Insurance Authority in May 2024. 1 student from 4R, achieved Second Place and earned a \$1,000 cash coupon in the competition. Through these Online Quiz Competitions, students gained valuable insights into personal finance management, enhancing their lifelong skills.

- For the Geography Department, mind maps and flow charts serve as effective tools for organizing students' notes, enabling teachers to assess comprehension and retention of key concepts. This process confirms that learning outcomes are achieved and identifies areas requiring additional support. Additionally, 1 S6 student participated as a recognised NGO observer in the 28th United Nations Climate Change Conference (COP28) in Dubai in December 2023, showcasing a commitment to sustainable development. Furthermore, all S5 students attended a field trip to the Sha Tin Sewage Treatment Works on August 7, 2024, as part of their educational activities.
- For the Home Economics Department, over 90% of students successfully completed assessments on the e-platform and proposed healthier alternatives for their families using a healthy diet toolbox of their choice. This experience enhanced their understanding of nutrition, diet, and health while fostering self-motivated learning habits. Throughout the year, students participated in various competitions, such as the "Water Saving Culinary Challenge" organised by the Water Supplies Department and M21.hk, as well as the "Hong Kong Mental Health Online Competition 2" hosted by the Blessing Club. These activities not only broadened their horizons but also encouraged practical application of their knowledge in real-world contexts.
- For Tourism and Hospitality Studies Department, S.5 students visited Hong Kong Disneyland on the 26th of February to participate in the Disney's Foundations for Career Success Workshops. Through the workshops, they not only knew about the corporate culture and operation methods of Disney, but also participated in a field trip around the work environment at the Hong Kong Disneyland Hotel. The experience deepened their understanding of the tourism and hospitality industry.

# 1.5 To provide students with multi-dimensional and diversified reading experience to enhance the deep reading

- Our school has been fostering a strong reading atmosphere, as we believe that developing students' reading habits is an essential part of nurturing self-motivated learners.
- According to the APASO and SHS surveys, approximately 81.4% of students regularly read
  materials such as leisure reading materials and newspapers outside class. These findings are
  corroborated by the SHS conducted by teachers, where over 90% reported that students enjoy
  reading. Similarly, about 81.2% of parents observed that their children have a fondness for
  reading.
- On November 23, the Cheung Sha Team from the Reading Dreams Foundation Limited visited SKSS for a professional exchange. During this visit, they engaged in discussions about reading education and gained insights into the school library's operations. The team explored strategies for fostering a reading culture on campus, enhancing their understanding of effective literacy programs. This interaction facilitated the sharing of best practices aimed at promoting reading among students and strengthening the educational environment.

- The Chinese Language Department has organised reading activities at all levels in conjunction with the Chinese Language Academic Day. A "Reading Club" and a "New Poetry Reading Club" have been established, with each session incorporating cultural reflection topics to facilitate in-depth learning.
- The "Mid-Autumn Festival Reading Sharing Programme" was co-organised by the SKSS Library and the Parent-Teacher Association, was successfully held on 27th September, 2023. Students shared about their reading experiences in small groups to communicate and learn from one another, thus seeking interest and joy in reading together. As the Mid-Autumn Festival was coming, participants were also gifted with parent volunteer's delicately handmade mooncakes.
- The Sun Kei Book Fair was successfully held from 19th March to 21st March 2024 at the school hall, with "25-year Bookmance" as this year's theme. The Book Fair featured displays of all-time classics recommended by teachers and students over the past 25 years, savouring the sentiments of past Book Fairs and fostering positivity for the future. The Book Fair lasted for 3 days and was actively participated by teachers and students, forming a reading atmosphere throughout the campus.
- The Chinese Language Department, Chinese Language Society and School Library jointly organised a Book Talk featuring a "living library". Three Chinese Language teachers roleplayed as real-life authors to create a "human library". Vice Principal Ms. TSUI Yukching, Teachers Ms. CHAU Ka-yu and Mr. CHAN King-yip acted as Xiao Hong, Sanmao and Jin Yong respectively to introduce their life stories, creative motifs and themes of their works to students. Throughout the event, teachers and students exchanged their ideas and engaged in an enthusiastic discussion.
- The "Secondary One Storytelling Contest" organised by the Chinese Language Department was successfully held on the 18th of April. Students prepared adequately and performed skillfully with excellent voice projection and affection, attracting over 100 teachers and students as the audience.

# 1.6 To empower teachers with professionalism in implementing teaching ideas regarding deep learning

- In this year, a total of 27 meetings were organised for core subjects along with 6 meetings for elective subjects in our every Thursday Professional Learning Community (PLC) Session. Panel heads facilitated various sharing sessions with panel members, and each teacher submitted a self-reflection form at the end of the school term. There were two open classroom activities held by English teacher and ICT teacher to all teachers. After each lesson observation, a post lesson discussion was arranged. Teachers in different KLAs could share their views together. All the teachers submitted their lesson plans which applied deep learning strategies in their lesson.
- To enhance teaching effectiveness and use data to improve teaching, the school has implemented Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) for all teachers since 2021 school year. The

teachers welcomed this measure and found it meaningful. Most teachers agreed that their teaching could provoke students to ask questions and stimulate thinking, as well as arouse students' interest and inquiry spirit in subject knowledge. They have adjusted teaching content and strategies to increase students' sense of learning achievement. Their subject expertise has given students confidence in their teaching.

- Besides, all teachers of public exam classes completed the KPI questionnaires for reflection.
   Subject heads had to submit statistical analysis on the 2023 DSE Exam and S6 Pre-Mock Examination analysis to school in November 2023. After this professional dialogue, the culture of professional sharing of good teaching practice was strengthened.
- Two staff development training sessions were held during Friday SDD sessions by Teaching and Learning Committee. Overall, teachers were satisfied with both sessions, scoring over 4.38 out of 5. In the November session, new teachers and panel heads were invited to share strategies for enhancing deep learning. In the May session, a guest speaker from Hong Kong 01 (Founder of Relearn) was invited to discuss AI and prompt creation. This sharing session was inspiring and useful for the teachers, and more interactive activities are preferred.
- The Online Learning Hub has been continuously updated with various resources. It is encouraging to observe an increase in the quality of assignments from homework inspections. More students prepared their own revision notes this year, as noted through lesson observations. The teaching and learning survey provided additional evidence of this improvement. The teaching and learning survey provided additional evidence of progress. Dialogues between teachers can significantly enhance professional development.
- The English Department of Kau Yan College visited our school for professional exchange on the 6th of March, 2024, sharing strategies on pedagogical approach and curriculum planning. The Mathematics Department of MKMCF Ma Chan Duen Hey Memorial College visited our school for professional exchange on the 29th of January, 2024, sharing experiences in marking senior form examination papers and enhancement and remedial strategies for both junior and senior forms.

#### Reflections

- 1. In summary, the year-long plan for Major Concern 1, aimed at promoting and enhancing the effectiveness of learning and teaching for academic excellence, was successfully implemented. This success can be attributed to our students' intrinsic motivation to learn and the concerted efforts of our dedicated staff members.
- 2. Subject teachers continuously assessed student performance through various assignments and tests. The school provided multiple self-directed learning online platforms, such as the Online Question Bank (HKedCity) and English Builder. As a result, students were able to complete learning tasks at their own pace, while teachers gained valuable insights into the learning progress and outcomes of individual students.

- 3. To recognise our students' academic achievements, two Prize Giving Ceremonies were held in January and July 2024. This year, over 500 students received certificates and book coupons for their academic excellence. This award system minimises the negative impacts of competition and encourages students to strive towards their goals.
- 4. With the implementation of the new AI curriculum by the Education Bureau (EDB), further consolidation of the existing chapters will take place in 2024-2025. Students in the Coding Team have demonstrated potential in developing AI applications through organised activities. Therefore, the Coding Team should consider planning additional activities related to the chapters they have studied under the project for the 2024-2025 academic year.

### Feedback & Follow up

- 1. The school should persist in encouraging student participation in external competitions. While winning is a commendable goal, it is not the sole focus; we place a strong emphasis on teamwork and collaboration, both of which are essential for holistic student development. Competitions serve to bridge gaps among students and promote collaborative efforts. Engaging in such activities equips students with a diverse range of skills, including an expanded knowledge base, improved language proficiency, and the generic skills necessary for successful participation.
- 2. The cultivation of self-evaluation habits among students is of significant importance, as it contributes to the enhancement of their generic skills, particularly self-management. By fostering the development of these skills, we can also improve creativity, communication, problem-solving, and collaboration, especially when students engage in group work.
- 3. The utilization of assessment as a learning tool represents a strategic approach to enhancing students' educational experiences. This approach enables students to clearly understand their learning objectives while allowing teachers to monitor student progress and reflect on instructional methods. It is recommended that subject departments integrate elements of self-reflective learning into assessment tasks. Furthermore, various modes of assessment will be introduced in the upcoming year to further engage students in their learning journey.

### **Achievements**

### 2.1 To enable students with a sense of responsibility towards school, society and our nation

- The Launch Ceremony of Moral Education Day 2023 was successfully held on 19th September, 2023. The theme this year is "Strive Ahead with Support, Renovate with Grace". The ceremony hosted by our School Supervisor Dr. SO Kwok-sang. Dr. SO encouraged our students to remember the meaning and significance of "LIKE" (Love, Integrity, Knowledge, Endurance), and strive to be a sincere, truth-seeking, and persevering person who loves God and others. Student representatives from all forms also responded positively to the theme through promising to act according to the pledge and encouraging each other.
- Three assemblies with the theme of responsibility towards school, society and our nation were conducted. Four class teacher period activities and a whole school activities were organised to promote the concept of "responsibility towards school". Based on the students' feedback, they learnt and applied the concept of responsibility.
- Sun Kei Secondary School's Opening Ceremony was successfully held on 4 September 2023. Following closely was Sun Kei's 25th Anniversary School Celebration segment. First, the emcee played a short film commemorating the anniversary. Then, a question-and-answer game and lucky draw were carried out, creating a lively atmosphere. At the end of the ceremony, the honoured guests and student leaders collectively popped balloons and, together with all teachers and students, read out the theme of the anniversary: "Innovate in Legacy, Renovate with Grace".
- The "Crossing New Frontier: Celebrating Our 25th Anniversary Together" event was successfully completed on 19th October, 2023. Despite the strong winds, Sun Kei teachers and students persevered. Everyone stepped out of their classrooms, walked along the Tseung Kwan O Waterfront Park, and up the Tseung Kwan O Cross Bay Bridge, witnessing the rapid development of the community along the way.
- The Sun Kei 25th Anniversary Thanksgiving Ceremony was successfully held on the 24th of February, 2024, with Ms. LI Mei-sheung Michelle, JP, Permanent Secretary for Education of the HKSAR Government Education Bureau, and Rev. CHEUNG Koon-wan Gordon, Vice Chairperson of the Christian and Missionary Alliance Church Union Hong Kong Executive Committee as the officiating guests. Through the topic of 'Two Points of Gratitude and Three Points of Hope', Ms. LI Mei-sheung Michelle, JP expressed her appreciation towards our school's teaching community for their contributions in the education sector of Hong Kong. She also encouraged Sun Kei to continue nurturing moral and talented students through integrating science and education. Through the biblical stories of Eben-Ezer, Rev. CHEUNG Koon-wan Gordon expressed his gratitude towards God's grace and blessings towards Sun Kei's educational missions. After their sharings, the school's teaching staff sang "When You

Believe" together, with the ceremony concluding in a round of non-stop cheering and applause.

## 2.2 To improve main experiential activities of each form to foster students' positive values and affections

- The 25th Anniversary Open Days were successfully held from the 23rd to 24th of February 2024. More than 20 classrooms were opened for public visits. The education achievements and development of SKSS were displayed, attracting numerous alumni, parents, students from neighbouring schools and members of the public. Approximately 3,000 visitors toured the school in two days. Programmes on the Open Days included themed exhibitions, student instrument performances, an alumni concert, a Visual Arts exhibition and themed game booths, all which enabled our guests to experience the colourful and eventful SKSS school life.
- Our school's Wind Band organised the Singapore Music Exchange Tour from 17th to 20th of July, with 17 students travelling to the Yong Siew Toh Conservatory of Music to participate in the Singapore Raffles International Music Festival and attained the Gold Award. Our students also visited numerous Singaporean schools for in-depth exchanges of wind performances, during which they expanded their horizons and enriched their musical experiences through the mingling of music and culture.
- Different experiential activities were held to foster students' positive value and affective characteristics in different growth stages. For S1, rock climbing activities were conducted. Students wrote a letter for themselves for 5 years later. It encouraged students to set targets for themselves with the value of "begin with the end in mind" is implied.
- All S2 students reached out to do voluntary work in local conservation on Life-side Learning
  Day. Three groups of total 84 students joined coastal cleanup activities at different beaches,
  and 38 students joined a WWF program to clear wild grass. Students' awareness in protecting
  the environment was enhanced.
- The "Hong Kong Japanese School Sun Kei Secondary School Cultural Exchange Visit" was held successfully on the 18th of January. Through visiting the campus of Sun Kei Secondary School, Hong Kong Japanese School teachers and students continued to strengthen the friendship between the two schools. 40 secondary two Sun Kei students engaged in cultural exchange activities in groups with students from the Secondary Section of Hong Kong Japanese School, sharing the special features of their own cultures and acquiring a deepened understanding of them.
- For S3 national education study tour was conducted. The service quality of tour is satisfactory. It is meaningful for S3 students to build up national identity.
- S4 adventure day camp was organised, and the atmosphere of unity and cooperation were promoted in S4.
- To enhance students' understanding of Chinese culture, our S5 students participated in the academic lectures and guided tours of the Hong Kong Palace Museum, which were organised

- by Hong Kong 01. The lecture was themed "The Forbidden City and Chinese culture of Pre-Qin", with Dr. LAM Weng-cheong, Associate Professor of the Department of History and the Department of Anthropology of the Chinese University of Hong Kong, as the lecturer. After the lecture, students also joined a guided tour through the museum.
- Value and affective education activities were organised in class teacher periods and assemblies. At least 80% of all students participated in Value education assemblies which were conducted and decided according to different form from S1 to S6.

### 2.3 To promote positive mental health and support students in need

- Sun Kei Secondary School's Opening Ceremony was successfully held on 4 September 2023. The theme this year is "Connect with God and renew your life". Through the Bible verse "When times are good, enjoy the good; when times are bad, consider", Rev. CHOI Hong-yi, Colon, General Secretary of Asian Outreach Ltd., encouraged students to always have faith in Christ, and not to lose one's joy when faced with life changes. Principal, Mr. HO Chunyan, motivated students to welcome the new academic year with a positive attitude, and warmly introduced all teachers and staff; the hall was filled with harmony and joy.
- Watoto Children's Choir Asia Tour 2023 "We Will Go" was successfully staged on 6th October, 2023 in SKSS. Watoto is a holistic care programme that was initiated as a response to the overwhelming number of orphaned children and vulnerable women in Uganda, whose lives have been ravaged by war and disease. Our teachers and students enjoyed a wonderful performance by the Watoto Children's choir in an excellent atmosphere, with everyone cheering and dancing along with the pleasant melody and upbeat rhythm. The passion and love for performing which the choir expressed moved everyone.
- Themed "Creating happiness through self-caring", the 2023 Mental Health Day was held on the 24th of November. On that day, the school organised a variety of booth games, including making leather accessories, shrinkable film pendants and writing heartfelt cards. In support of and reminding students to relax and care for themselves on a regular basis, the event encouraged students to overcome stress and difficulties in a positive manner, creating a loving and caring campus culture.
- The 2023 Student Support Day was held on the 24th of November, during which students had individual consultations with their class teachers. Through the half-hour conversations, class teachers acquired a greater understanding of their students regarding their studies, interpersonal relationships, career planning and more. Students also gained support in establishing new goals and fostering hopes for the future.
- The Secondary 6 Cheer Up Station, which was organised by the Parent-Teacher Association, was held in the morning assembly session on the 28th of February. Mr. CHAN King-ho, Chairperson of the Parent-Teacher Association, expressed the care and support from parents to the S.6 DSE candidates and encouraged them to persevere and spare no effort in face of the public examination. Following his speech, all the parent committee members presented

- the "Star" souvenirs to the student representatives of each S.6 class, symbolising students receiving results with stars in the DSE Examination while expressing gratitude to teachers.
- Movie appreciation activities were organised for students. Based on the survey's feedback, students appreciated the positivity message in the movie, and they promised to work out positive lifestyle.

## 2.4 To nurture student leaders with a sense of responsibility towards school, society and our nation.

- Sun Kei student leaders took the oath of office on 27th September, 2023. They pledged to serve the school in the coming academic year as servant leaders with commitment. In the sharing session, the outgoing Head All-round Leaders reported the activities held in 2022-2023 and recounted the rewarding experience as student leaders. They also took the opportunity to express sincere gratitude to teacher advisors for their guidance.
- The 23st Sai Kung District Outstanding Students Award Presentation Ceremony was held on 24th August, 2024. Students won 3 trophies and 3 certificates in the Senior Secondary Section and Junior Secondary Section. It is expected that Sun Kei students will continue to strive for excellence and proactively serve the community. Jointly organised by the Sai Kung Cultural Centre Community Development Foundations, Sai Kung District School Heads Association and Friendship Cohesion and sponsored by Sai Kung District Office, this event aims to give recognition and appreciation to students for their excellent leadership. It also encourages students to have a positive influence on their peers to inspire others to dedicate themselves to lifelong learning and participate actively in social services in the future.
- Sponsored by the Japanese government, the Japan-East Asia Network of Exchange for Students and Youths Program was successfully organised from the 10th to 16th of December 2023. CHAN Man-ching from 5M was successfully nominated as a Hong Kong representative team member, during which she travelled to Japan to exchange and learn. CHAN Man-ching participated in an array of diverse activities, including visits to Japanese schools, homestaying with a Japanese family, visiting the Marubeni Gallery, Kiyomizu-dera, Kyoto Food Culture Museum and Nijō Castle. Through the activities, she acquired a profound understanding of Japanese etiquette, history, historical monuments, traditional apparel, religious culture and culinary habits, forming friendships with locals in her journey.
- The Hong Kong Extra-Curricular Activities Masters' Association organised the 2023-2024
  Hong Kong Outstanding Students in Extra-curricular Activities Recognition Scheme Award
  Ceremony on the 11th of May, in which WONG Sum-yi from 5S was awarded the Certificate
  of Appreciation for her outstanding performance.
- In the Greater Bay Area Outstanding Students Award 2024 which was organised by the Hong Kong School Managers Society, FAN Ho-yiu from 3S and CHAN Man-ching from 5M were respectively awarded the Merit Award in the Junior and Senior Category. The award aims to recognise students within the Greater Bay Area who have outstanding achievements in academics, talent, and social services.

# 2.5 To nurture students with compassionate mindset and positive values likes self-confident, caring for others and commitment by promoting "Service Learning"

- S1-S5 students participated both on and off campus volunteer service, and a total of 14,352 service hours were recorded.
- S3-S5 students participated the 4C Youth Volunteer Leadership Programme. Students organised 2 volunteer service and joint 1 volunteer service.
- Participated the "Paddy in our school" programme for natural affective nurture and social service. Rice growing workshop, on site farming practices and in school paddy growing were conducted successfully. Students enjoyed the tour to farmland very much.
- "Community Tour Guide@TKO" programme is organized, and three tours were designed by our students to serve different target groups. It is worthy to organise since students and participants can know more about TKO, sense of belongings is also enhanced.

### 2.6 To develop an I.E. (Invitational Education) Environment by the whole school

- I.E. activity was organised on the first day of school year. Besides, Inviting Classroom Design, Wall of Grace, ECA boards, Post Examination Activity (Thanksgiving Activity) and teachers' birthday celebration were arranged to promote I.E. atmosphere.
- To celebrate Sun Kei's 25th anniversary and cheer for Sun Kei teachers and students, a series of surprise events were organised on 12th September, 2023, including game booths and free ice cream prepared by the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Hong Kong (ELCHK). Everyone took numerous photos on that day, creating awesome memories together.
- Sun Kei's 25th Anniversary Thanksgiving Banquet was held successfully on the 26th of April at Paramount Banquet Hall (MegaBox) in Kowloon Bay. There were 28 tables in the banquet, which let around 300 guests, teachers, parents, alumni, staff members and students gather together to celebrate Sun Kei's Jubilee. There were abundant activities, including "From Generation to Generation" Sun Kei family sharing, teacher appreciation activities, alumni performances, Q&A games and surprise lucky draws, which enabled guests to reminisce our school's development over the past 25 years, witness each other's personal growth, and share joyful and touching moments.
- The 29th Teacher Appreciation Scheme Sun Kei Outstanding Teachers Awards were presented on the 29th of May. The teacher awardees were selected by all teachers and students respectively in recognition of those who excel in their professional education endeavours.

# 2.7 To nurture a sense of responsibility towards society fulfilling a civic citizen's responsibility through routine regular and special civic activities

• Flag raising ceremony was held in the morning assembly once a week and on the special school day, i.e. first day and last day of each school terms, sports day, national days, Hong Kong Special Administrative Region Establishment Day, National Constitution Day and National Security Education Day.

- As 4th December is National Constitution Day, the Moral, Civic and National Education Team of our school invited the Constitution and Basic Law Mobile Resource Centre to visit our school on 15th November. Exhibition boards, interactive video games and game booths related to the Constitution and Basic Law were set up, providing students with the valuable opportunity to learn about our country's aspects, history, Constitution and the Basic Law in a diverse and interesting manner. They have developed with a better understanding of our country's development and a stronger sense of our national and cultural identity.
- Student leaders showed excellence in organization of Sun Kei Forums. Participants actively involved in Sun Kei Forum.
- Class Teacher Lesson Activities were held to educate national security and civic learning. Election education learning, national day learning and national security learning has been held.
- Nation flag hoisting ceremony can enrich to the national identity of students and teachers, especially resumption of morning assembly at basketball court every Wednesday.
- The sinology knowledge competition "Chinese Cultural Zhuang Yuan Hong" was successfully held during the weekly assembly on the 21st of May. Throughout the competition, the hosts enthusiastically asked a series of questions, while all teachers and students were fully engaged with the ongoing interaction between the stage and the audience. In addition, Chinese Society student representatives acted as the hosts of Sun Kei News and emcees of the Academy Awards Ceremony, who announced the list of winning students in the inter-form competition. The atmosphere was lively with all participants immersed in Chinese culture.
- In support of the National Security Education Day on the 15th of April, our school organised the "iTeen" visit to the Independent Commission Against Corruption (ICAC) Building. Through the activity, students engaged in a variety of experiential learning activities, which enabled them to understand and reflect on their national responsibility.
- The Guangzhou Sister School Exchange Cum Cultural and Historical Study Tour was successfully organised from the 21st to 23rd of March, 2024. 127 Sun Kei students and teachers visited our sister school, Guangzhou Guangyuan Middle School. They participated in various exchange activities with local students, including a joint-school talent show, arts carnival and ball games, which strengthened the friendship between teachers and students of both cities. In addition, they gained valuable insights through a series of experiential activities, including nighttime boat tours on the Pearl River, visiting the Academician Longping Port Base of Agricultural Education and the Memorial Museum of Generalissimo Sun Yat-sen's Mansion.
- The China Manned Space Delegation visited Hong Kong in late November. Our school was honoured to be invited to attend the "Dialogue Session with Secondary and Primary School Students" exchange event on the 29th of November. The event provided Sun Kei students with the valuable opportunity to communicate face-to-face with aviation pioneers, acquire a profound understanding of our country's newest developments and achievements in aviation

- technology, and learn about the various aspects in the astronauts' daily lives and their most interesting encounters in space.
- 30 junior form students and 3 teachers from our school travelled to Xiamen from 16th to 18th July for an expedition on the innovative technology industry. They visited the corporations in the Fujian Free-Trade Zone Xiamen Subdistrict, Longshan Wenchuangyuan, Xiamen University and Xiamen Hi-tech Innovation Center. The tour not only enhanced students' understanding of the current developments in the innovative technology industry in Xiamen, but also cultivated their interest in science and developed their innovative spirit.
- 4 students from Sun Kei participated in the 8th Chinese Culture and Tradition Heritage Forum for Secondary School Students, which was organised by The Second High School Attached to Beijing Normal University during the summer holiday. Approximately two hundred teachers and students shared their insights and understanding of Chinese traditional culture in the forum on the theme "Courage and Perseverance". Our students actively participated in the various activities, attaining the "Perfect Match" award in the activity "Good Things to Say" and the "Best Design", "Best Display" and "Most Regionally Representative" awards in the activity "Brilliance in Different Colours", all of which obtained recognition from fellow teachers and classmates. In addition, CHAN Ling-kwan from 4I and OUYANG Kaiqi from 5S were interviewed by the Beijing Radio and Television Station and China Central Television respectively to share their views on the forum.
- Vice Principal Ms. TSUI Yuk-ching accepted the invitation from The Hong Kong Institute for Promotion of Chinese Culture to visit the Huawei Base on 25th November, 2023 (Saturday). On that day, Vice Principal Ms. TSUI Yuk-ching, along with fellow professionals, doctors and principals, visited the Huawei Shenzhen Base, where Huawei's headquarters and core base are situated. In the afternoon, they also visited the 127-hectare Huawei Songshan Lake Xi Liu Bei Po Village in Dongguan, which was constructed at a cost of 10 billion yuan.
- According to the APASO findings, the Q-scores for National Identity (Responsibility, Obligations) (Proud, Love) (National Flag, Anthem) (Achievements) are both 116, which shows some positive and observable outcomes related to national education.

### 2.8 To implement the curriculum framework of National Security Education

- The school regularly reviews the content and quality of classroom instruction and teaching resources to ensure that the design of the school-based curriculum aligns with the "Curriculum Framework of National Security Education in Hong Kong." This framework serves as a guideline for implementing national security education in secondary schools, as mandated by the Education Bureau. Reviews are conducted through lesson observations, book inspections, professional learning community sessions, and internal meetings.
- During the department head meeting on April 16, 2024, the Vice Principal reminded the Subject Panels to review the "Curriculum Framework of National Security Education in Hong Kong" and related subject curriculum frameworks. The Vice Principal also distributed a checklist to ensure the completion of relevant tasks.

- All learning objectives and elements outlined in the "Curriculum Framework of National Security Education in Hong Kong" have been incorporated into the teaching schedule.
   Relevant learning activities have been added to the program plan or teaching schedule, referencing examples of teaching and learning activities provided by the Education Bureau.
- To facilitate school management and enable the Education Bureau to access pertinent data for corresponding learning stages, subject departments are required to maintain records for a minimum of two academic years.
- The school implements national security education through classroom instruction in subjects such as Chinese History, History, and Citizenship and Social Development, as well as through life-wide learning activities. These initiatives aim to enhance students' understanding of the rule of law and the conditions of our country, thereby underscoring the importance of national security and fostering a strong sense of national identity.
- For example, to broaden students' national and global perspectives, topics such as Space Exploration in China (e.g., Tiangong 1) and Chinese astronauts like Nie Haisheng were introduced in S4 Physics. Additionally, nuclear safety and security in China were covered in S5 Physics, thereby expanding the breadth of knowledge to include national security education.

#### **Reflections**

- 1. The plan for Major Concern 2, which aimed to empower our students with a positive and compassionate mindset, as well as inspire them with a sense of respect and responsibility towards society, our nation, and the world, was successfully implemented over the past 3 years. Our school participated in the competition of Outstanding Teaching Award for Moral Education organised by the Education Bureau with the theme 'Empathy' in 2022. Thanks to our teachers and students for their proactive promotion and practice, our school was awarded the Certificate of Merit. This success can be attributed to the dedication of our staff members, who nurtured students' positive values such as mutual respect, acceptance, and appreciation through structured whole-school programs.
- 2. From these 3 years APASO data, our school's national security education programme has been successfully promoted, and students' knowledge of and identification with the country and their identity are also very satisfactory. This shows that national security education is indispensable for teachers, students, and parents.
- 3. Last year was the 25th anniversary of the school. Through a series of celebratory activities, all students at the school participated, which not only enhanced the sense of belonging of the students and united all teachers and students, but also created a positive atmosphere on campus and enhanced the positive energy.

4. The problem of the epidemic in the early years led to the implementation of online classes in schools. Students growing up at that time lacked social skills, and social problems started to emerge when they entered the adolescent stage of secondary school, and emotional problems could easily arise, so schools have to pay more attention to these needy students.


### Feedback & Follow up


- 1. After the 25th anniversary, students have a sense of belonging to the school, are engaged in school activities, trust the school, and have excellent teacher-student relationship, which is a very good cornerstone to help solve students' problems in growing up and realizing their potential.
- 2. As students and parents have high expectations of students' academic performance and students are under considerable academic pressure, it is advisable to strengthen the policy on enhancing students' mental health by raising teachers' and parents' awareness and strengthening skills training, while at the student level, emphasis should be placed on organizing more physical, mental and spiritual health activities to raise students' awareness of their mental health needs.
- 3. National security education should be strengthened on all fronts, so that students can move from the cognitive level to the experiential level, and experience more about their country through participating in national activities, going on exchanges in the mainland, or organizing relevant activities.

### 3. Student Performance

### **HKDSE Examination**

Candidates of SKSS meeting the 332A-2 entrance requirement of universities for degree programmes in 2024 DSE Examination stand at 87, accounting for 87.0% of all Sun Kei's participants in the examination. Students meeting the 22222 requirement for subsidised sub-degree programmes amount to 99, being 99.0% of the Sun Kei candidates sitting for the examination.





### **Achievements and Awards**

Our school actively encourages students to step outside the campus to participate in all kinds of inter-school competitions. In 2023 - 2024, 92.35% of junior form students and 76.9% of senior form students have respectively participated in inter-school competitions. In the process, students have received various awards and honours making a total of 493 items this year including 49 championships, 23 second places, 26 third places, 17 first class awards, 38 second class awards, 32 third class awards, 31 gold awards, 44 silver awards, 52 bronze awards and 50 merit awards. Details of the awards are shown in appendix XV.

### **Overseas Study Tours**

Over the years, visits have been made to overseas destinations in Britain, Japan, Singapore, India, the Indonesia, and Australia as well as to cities in Mainland such as Beijing, Shanghai, Hangzhou, Shenzhen, Zhongshan and Qingyuan. At the same time, our school is active in developing an education network through pluralistic academic exchanges.
